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Message from Pastor Jim: We Never Closed!

Back in March, we closed the physical doors of our historic sanctuary for Sunday worship. At the same time, we opened new virtual doors to our sanctuary and church through our livestreaming of Sunday worship. Committee and team members continued to engage and interact through online conferencing – Zoom, MS Teams, Uber-Conferencing, etc. Members and staff made greater use of our telephones to connect with one another during "Shelter at Home" and "Safer at Home". Many wonderful activities and plans were

cancelled. Holy Week and Easter were different.

So much has changed in terms of what we used to do and how we used to do it. Everyone has had to learn new behaviors. Everyone has had to develop new ways of thinking and relating. Many have had to postpone celebrations or drastically alter their plans – graduations, weddings, funerals, birthdays, anniversaries, and more.

I always begin putting each newsletter together by making a copy of the last issue and updating from there—adding, removing, and updating as needed. As I scrolled through that March issue, I was reminded of just how thoroughly our plans have been disrupted. We had so many things in the works that have been cancelled, gone virtual, or otherwise been massively revised or reconsidered. So many things!

Sunday Worship—virtual; Dinner Church during Lent—cancelled; Easter and Holy Week Worship—virtual; Adult small groups—some virtual, some suspended; New STEAM Sunday school program—suspended; Forever Young programs—cancelled; VBS Knights of North Castle—cancelled; Signature Mission activities at Loudoun Homeless Services Center—suspended; Great Beginnings Preschool—virtual; REACH Mission trip—cancelled and recrafted as local mission opportunities; General Conference—postponed to 2021;

...and so many other things that weren't the subject of a March newsletter article. There is so much to grieve for, but now, four months later, it's time to look past the grief—work and pray past the grief if it's still got a grip on you. There was so much to be afraid of—is still so much to be concerned about, truth be told.

And yet, so much remains unchanged.

God's people are people with an eternal hope, who are called to look past fear and to live as prudent and thankful stewards of the life they've been given. We are personally called to do the work God has given us to do, and corporately called to fulfill the mission and vision of Leesburg UMC.

your church staff and leaders are continuing to move forward in developing new ways to be in ministry together. Part of our learning involves discovering how to live and be the church that now must respond to outside forces: COVID-19 and the search for a vaccine; the requirements imposed by our state and whichever recovery phase we are in; the guidelines of whichever stage our Virginia Conference has designated for all our United Methodist churches (currently still in Stage 2). Let me be quick to add that our Bishop and VA Conference leaders take seriously the safety of all our churches and the people we reach.

So here's where we are - and here's where we are headed. Our VA Conference "Stage 2" guidelines are more conservative than our state's "Phase 3" guidelines. We are limited to no more than 50% capacity with 6 ft social distancing for indoor worship; and no more than 50 persons for any other church activity. Everyone must wear a mask on church property - outside included - and maintain strict social distancing. In worship services, we may have music but no congregational singing – outdoors or indoors. We may have a soloist in outdoor worship who is masked and at least 25 ft from the nearest person. We must register in advance of the worship time and be able to answer "Yes" to the 4 questions on the Health Acknowledgment Form (Note: this no longer needs to be completed in advance but can be acknowledged when arriving for worship.).

With all of this in mind, and not knowing when United Methodists will be in Stage 3 (easing of many of these restrictions), our Healthy Church Team has helped us take a phased approach to expanding worship opportunities. We began with outdoor youth service activities in June and July. We then added outdoor Communion with our Neighborhood Groups in July. Beginning August 2, we will have outdoor worship, with Communion, in our parking lot (see more info on this). We are currently developing our plan for a return to indoor, in-person worship, with the Stage 2 requirements. No date has been set as we want to first experience and evaluate our outdoor, inperson worship.



In the meantime, we will continue to provide our Sunday morning worship through livestreaming, and plan to continue this even when we return to indoor worship. We'll continue to strengthen our connections through our Neighborhood Groups and the three priorities of Gather, Grow, Connect. We are re-visioning our other ministry plans for the fall for children, youth, and adults that will focus on virtual gatherings and in-person activities that meet our Stage 2 requirements. We'll keep caring for one another and seeking to reach new people with the saving grace of God.

Our world is changing. Our lives have changed. Our church is changing. In all of this we continue to learn, to explore new ways of being the church, to support mission efforts in our community and beyond, and find ways to stay connected.

The promise of God in this historic season of our lives continues to be reflected in the words recorded by Isaiah the prophet: "Fear not, for I am with you; be not dismayed, for I am your God. I will strengthen you, yes, I will help you, I will uphold you with My righteous right hand" (Isaiah 41:10).

We continue the "LUMC Worship Connection," our 10 am livestream of Sunday morning worship, and we invite you to join us . The music, prayer, scripture and message are designed to encourage, inspire, inform, and empower us to live as faithsharers, hope-lifters, and love-givers during these unusual times! What a challenge – yet God is with us (Isaiah 41:10).

In August, we'll wrap up our journey through Paul's message to the Ephesian churches on how God is reconciling all things

(Ephesians chapter 6, Aug 2 and Aug 9). Then we'll search the scriptures to see the many ways in which "God Makes A Way" when we cannot. We'll also hear from one another the stories of God turning our setbacks into comebacks, our detours into new directions, and our obstacles into opportunities

Before Jesus' followers were called Christians, they were known as the people of "The Way". Beginning August 16, Pastor Jim will be sending out a daily inspiration, "The Way for Today", as a prayer reminder and encouragement to trust God.

Sunday Evening Worship

Join us for outdoor worship and the sacrament of Holy Communion, Sunday evenings at 7 pm, in our back parking lot behind Aldersgate (off Liberty Street). This informal time of worship will last about 30 minutes and we invite you to bring your own folding chair or lawn chair. There will be parking for seniors on Liberty Street. Other parking is available in the Blossom and Bloom lot and in the parking lot of Leesburg Presbyterian Church. Remember that it's summer and outdoors - this is a casual event where shorts and sandals are perfectly appropriate!

Basic Requirements:

- Register in advance which includes health acknowledgement
- Pre-attendance temperature check at home (stay home if temperature is 100.4 or more)
- Maintain Social distance of at least 6 ft from others people/households
- Face coverings are required
- No hugs, handshakes, etc.
- Bring your own communion elements (bread and grape juice) or use our prepackaged
- Bring your own chair or plan to stand (service will be approx. 30 minutes)

Attendance is limited to 50 people, so sign up now!



Distance Learning...

You get to do distance learning again this fall, whether you signed up for it or not. As one who has worked with kids and teens for many years, mostly in other settings, but with some classroom experience, here are a few tidbits to keep in mind:

• Be flexible. Each teacher and each kid has a different style and almost none of them is working in their optimal envi-



ronment. Some might actually be more productive working on their bed or with music playing or sitting outside—and that's okay. They also might need a change of scenery; the living room for math, the basement for English, etc. They are used to different classrooms for different subjects.

- They need peers. They need socialization, work groups, ways to let off steam. School is supposed to be social, let them work on their assignments while they chat with their friends, that's what makes school take all day, instead of only a few hours.
- They're probably normal. They might experience loneliness, depression, anxiety—just listen and don't try to fix everything. Listen more than you advise. Watch for warning sings and make sure they (and you) are spending time with peers.
- They need breaks. They need to get up and walk to their next class, they need exercise and they need to shift gears from one thing to the next. Those breaks normally involve other people.
- They need structure. Keep in mind that for most kids and teens that doesn't mean a minute-by-minute itinerary, it means a basic routine that works for them.
- Offer grace. Your child is not falling behind. It's not a race. Everyone has been dealt the same hand. A few will find that they truly excel with this freedom to work more on their own terms, but most will struggle. If this was optimal, it would have been normal. It's not. You will get tired and frustrated, so will your kids and so will their teachers. Some days are going to be hard. Let it go. Declare a snow/sick/personal day, just not too often.
- Don't compare yourself or your kids or their teachers to others.

I was reminded recently that when Cortes and his men arrived in North America, he



burned their boats so that his men would let go of any fantasies of returning to Europe and they would move forward with their mission. It's not a perfect analogy, but we have to remember to keep moving forward. We are all explorers and pioneers now. The road before us has not been mapped; no one has gone before us.

Embrace the adventure!

Spirit of the Living God

Sometimes, often times, parts of songs will get stuck in my head and play nonstop on repeat. Sometimes its annoying and other times I find that its God's way of getting me to prayerfully pay attention to the words. This has been the case with the song "Spirit of the Living God" that we sang on Pentecost. The lyrics are:

"Spirit of the living God, fall afresh on me. Spirit of the living God, fall afresh on me. Melt me, mold me, fill me, use me. Spirit of the living God, fall afresh on me."

This song is a pleading request for God's Holy Spirit to fall on us and reside in us. How often do we ask for this? Do we really know what we are asking for? Being one of God's children, filled with His Spirit, isn't always a comfortable process. Below is a prayerful mediation on different phrases in the song. Take it as you will

"Melt me"- Like molten metal or molten rock. Take me in my current, sinful, state and melt everything away that does not serve you. It is hard to change. Its uncomfortable but it is right and good in you, Lord.

"Mold me" – Take me and shape me in your image. Bend me and twist me in whichever way you need me to be. Challenge me in all ways so that I don't live in comfort but in all ways reflect you.

"Fill me" – Lord, fill me with your Spirit. May my heart be filled with your Spirit, your love, and your praises. May I not be filled with my own, selfish, wishes and desires but rather they be a reflection of your Spirit filled in me.

"Use me" – Use me for your good will and your good purpose. Use me to share Jesus' love and ministry with everyone I meet. I haven't melted, molded, and filled just to do what I wish with your gifts, but to do your will and to go where you call me. Amen.

First half of 2020 giving statements were emailed on July 21 (for the small number of people without email on file, we mailed paper statements at the same time.)


