#### **November Sermons**

Much of our news these days is alarming. Division, disease, dissent, and disrespect seem to rule the day. In his timely book, Love is the Way, the Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church, Bishop Michael J. Curry, shares a vision of life for Christians and non-Christians that embraces the ethic of Jesus: "love your neighbor... love your

enemy". In November, Rev. Wray and I will be sharing some of the insights of Curry's book, along with our and others' thoughts on 1 Corinthians 13 – Paul's "more excellent way", the way of love.

"Love is the way" is a back-to-basics reminder of what it means for you me to join his work to transform the world! And, love is the way.

#### All Saints Sunday–November 1

On Sunday, November 1, we celebrate "All Saints Sunday". This ancient tradition invites us to remember those loved ones who have preceded us in death; especially those whose Christian faith made a deep impression upon us. In worship, we'll continue our tradition of the past 12 years of lighting a candle for our church members who have deceased since last All Saints Sunday; and we will light candles for our own loved ones who have died.

For those worshiping at home, prepare your worship space with your own special candle(s) to light at the appropriate time. Use the chat feature, or texting, to let us know who you would like to hold in remembrance. Our livestream worship will include sharing these names and lighting a candle in our sanctuary.

For those participating in our in-person morning worship, we'll be lighting candles of remembrance, one at a time, as we name our loved ones

For those who would like to come to the church but not worship inside, we'll have a socially-distanced opportunity outside, to remember loved ones and to light a candle at our outdoor altar table. This will be set up near our W Market Street entrance to the sanctuary.

Last, we will celebrate the sacrament of Holy Communion during both worship

services and invite those at home to join in by preparing your bread and grape

juice. Those who join us for our in-person worship will have the option of

receiving our pre-packaged communion elements to take home.

### **Looking Ahead to December Worship**

### "Raise your voice... raise it; don't be afraid!" - Isaiah 40:9

The history of humanity is fraught with pain–especially the pain that comes accompanied by fear and leads to oppression and violence of one people against another. This is the world into which Jesus was born and through which his teachings would challenge and call for transformation.

The opening words of an anonymous Jewish poet, "I believe in the sun, even when the sun is not shining," were scrawled on a basement wall of the Cathedral of Cologne, Germany, during the Holocaust. The words were originally put to music by Z. Randall Stroope, and for this series, composer and professor, Mark Miller, has written an original music score which we will be using with permission.

This theme song for our season calls us to examine our penchant for annihilating fear by annihilating each other. The power of narrative and music will call us to a different, gracious, response– transformation and reconciliation through hope, love, joy, and peace. This Advent and Christmas, let us fill the night with music and light and affirm and act on the reasons why we can still "believe, even when" we are discouraged.

### **CLT Corner: Highlights from your Church Leadership Team**

#### This Month: Trustees, SPRC, and Finance

#### **Trustees**

The Trustees have remained busy during the pandemic. Along with the church staff, we took measures to reduce utility usage in the currently under used areas of our buildings and also reduced our insurance premiums. Basic maintenance has continued using our team's talents as well as great help from the church youth.

We have signed a new two-year lease with Blossom and Bloom and taken measures to help them with their service to the community during these difficult times.

ADT has been authorized to begin a much needed upgrade to the fire alarm system in the main building. The existing system does not comply with the current building codes, isn't audible in all parts of the building and has had connection issues with wireless components. A large potion of the costs will be covered by a generous donation and also through use of a small portion of the Kitty Boyd memorial fund for work in the original 1852 building.

In 2021 the trustees plan to have the rubber membrane roof over the church offices, parlor and elevator replaced. We've been finding and repairing holes yearly and a few larger ones developed this year which were professionally patched. However, we were told that the roof is beyond periodic fixes.

### SPRC

The LUMC Staff/Pastor Parish Relations Committee is charged with several important duties and responsibilities that include working with the staff and the congregation to focus on the mission of the church by promoting unity and encouraging, strengthening, nurturing, supporting, and respecting the pastor(s), staff, and their families.

Much of the SPRC's work centers on the staff in developing and approving written job descriptions; recommending to the CLT written policies and procedures for staff actions (e.g., hiring, evaluations, etc.); recommending to the Committee on Finance and CLT staff salary actions; and, providing counsel to the pastor(s) and lay staff regarding their relationships with the congregation and conditions within the congregation that could affect those relationships.

Given the SPRC is centered around staff issues (e.g., staff actions, compensation, etc.), the Book of Discipline requires that any discussions or actions taken be kept within the SPRC. It is important to note that the SPRC has been actively involved with the Finance Committee and CLT to determine how best to maintain our current staff given the budget shortfall we're facing in 2020 and 2021.

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### Finance

The COVID-19 pandemic has made for an anomalous year financially for the church. Our giving and expenses are both down dramatically this year. The following chart summarizes both giving and income through the first 3 quarters of the year from 2014-2020.

Our lower expenses are seen in most every category, but the primary drivers have been the reduced apportionment and Trustee expenses.

LUMC will end 2020 in a healthy financial position thanks to our lower expenses this year and the CARES Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) loan of \$88,500. The loan is expected to be forgiven.


The 2021 budget reflected a serious CLT effort to align our expense accounts with income in


2 years. Our expenses will increase once our buildings are utilized similarly to pre-COVID usage. The following chart shows giving versus expenses (2020 values are projected) from 2014-2020.


LUMC's debt was refinanced this year at a favorable interest rate after receiving an incredibly generous donation of \$150,000 and our current debt is \$149,105. We are paying a minimum of \$8,000 monthly toward the debt. Our debt is expected to be eliminated by April 2022.

Lastly, our church reserve balance remains healthy. Subtracting the imminent Trustee fire alarm project cost, our present reserve level is \$150,000. Upon receiving forgiveness of our CARES PPP

loan, our reserves are expected to be in the \$230,000-\$240,000 range at year end.

### **Youth and Kids**







"Therefore, whenever we have the opportunity, we should do good to everyone – especially to those in the family of faith." Galatians 6:10 (Doing good to others radiates outwards.)



We choose to do good because of we are called by Jesus to the way of love, God's love.

In his book, <u>Love is the Way: Holding on to Hope in Troubled Times</u>, Bishop Michael Curry writes about the importance of each and every person choosing to love. The choice to love is not about warm feelings. It is about life-giving and love-showing actions in the lives of those around us. He shares about Father Andrew, a Botswanian Anglican Priest in Gaborone, the capital city. After relating a story about a young girl with undiagnosed polio who gradually learned to walk with crutches, he quotes Father Andrew, who said of his church's work with the poor, "We believe that God has something better in store for every child. And it's our job to help each child find out what that is and then live."

Bishop Curry's message (and I believe Jesus' message) is your love matters. He concludes, "The more we listen to love – let it guide us through life – the faster we find that... intersection where our deep gladness and the world's hunger meet and walk the path of love together." (Love is the Way, p.119).

Listen. Can you hear it? Will we live it? In this election year; in this COVID year; in this year of deep pain, protest, and quest for racial reconciliation; anger, blame, division, violence, hateful speech, false promises will not lead us where we need to go. Love is the way. Let's walk the path together.

### **Preparing Advent Wreaths for Worship at Home**

Advent is right around the corner (November 29), and we are encouraging each family and individuals to prepare for the season of Advent by making sure they have an Advent wreath. Some of you may already have a wreath in your Christmas decorations, if that is the case, we ask that you set it up and light it as we worship together on Sunday mornings.

If you don't have a wreath, there is plenty of time to prepare one. Below are examples of wreathes that you might be able to put together based on what you have at home or can easily purchase around town. The basic and most essential element to have is four candles and a way to light them. You can use battery operated tea lights, tall white pillar candles and wrap coordinating pink and purple ribbons on them, or you can use the traditional pink and purple taper candles. Below are some images for your inspiration with descriptions of the materials used to create an Advent wreath.

# ADVENT WREATH IDEAS

This example uses toilet paper rolls, a paper towel roll for the Christ candle, and pink and purple construction paper for the outside of

the candles. You could also use paint to paint the rolls the appropriate color. They uses tissue paper to create the flames and this



could be added each Sunday. A perfect wreath for those with small children.

This is a traditional advent wreath. You can



purchase the taper candles online as well as the wreath base and candles. You could then place fake or real evergreens around it to add a festive touch.

This wreath uses battery operated tea lights.

They have washi tape (pink and purple) around the lights, though construction paper would work as well. They have placed



the lights on a plate with evergreens beneath the lights. This would be a great option if you'd like to light your wreath daily when you turn on your Christmas tree.

This is a very simple Advent wreath with four pillar white candles

on a plate with evergreens and holly berries decorating it. You might also consider placing one



like this in front of a Nativity scene if you have one at home.

This is a clever wreath is made out of green play dough, pink and purple birthday candles, and a tea light. You shape the dough into a ball, press the tea light into the middle, and place the candles around the outside. You might see they also added some confetti to the top of the playdough for a bit of festive fun. This would be a great option for someone who has limited space. If you have multiple folks in your family who insist on lighting or

blowing out the candles let them each make their own with this method and avoid bickering over who gets to do what on Sunday morning.

#### You have a book club? Try a film club for Advent.


Our worship theme for Advent and Christmas comes from the Worship Design Studio series, "I Believe Even When..." This theme draws inspiration and hope from the song, "Inscription of Hope," whose words found were found written on a basement wall of the Cathedral of Cologne, Germany. The words were written, it is believed, by a child of one of the many Jewish families who hid in the cathedral at various times during the Nazi persecution.

I'll be hosting a film club during Advent that follows an incredible guide prepared by Worship Design Studio. This guide highlights five different documentary film clips that dramatically demonstrate the power of music during difficult and even seemingly hopeless circumstances.

Beginning Tuesday, November 24, 11 am, via Zoom, and for each Tuesday until December 22, we will see for example how those imprisoned in a concentration camp, a group of incarcerated young women, a country yearning for freedom from outside oppression, and more, give witness to the transforming grace of music.
