I M M E R S E: The Bible Reading Experience

We've just begun Immerse: Messiah. 'Twice each year, for the next three years, we're going to immerse ourselves in the story of the Bible for 8 or 16 weeks at a time. Our first immersion will be by reading the New Testament for the next 8 weeks. The Immerse approach presents the scriptures in a story-book format for youth and adults to read and appreciate. Daily readings will take us through the entire Bible in three years; and our daily readings this season will take us completely through the New Testament, although in a different order from how our Bibles are laid out.


Connect with others for these next 8 weeks by forming or joining a Bible Club to read through "Immerse: Messiah" together. Then meet virtually or in-person each week to discuss what you've read. Invite family and friends, near and far, to read with you (I'm inviting family in other states to connect)! Connect also in worship each Sunday as the message will highlight and illuminate portions of each week's readings.

You can sign up to be in a Bible club, or host your own Bible club. We'll show you how and provide support along the way.

"Immerse: Messiah" is available on Amazon Kindle or from Tyndale House Publishing in eBook. Softcover is also available on Amazon or Tyndale; or you can get a paperback through Leesburg UMC for \$11. Wednesday Worship During Lent

Wednesdays, 7 pm, February 17 through March 24, (Virtual) Palm Sunday, 10 am (Livestream) & 11:30 am (In-person)

As persons made in the image of God, each of us is created precious and holy, loved and valued by God. We have been through – and are still going through - an uncertain and anxious time since our last season of Lent. Like glass vessels, fractured into pieces, our sense of wholeness and normalcy has been shattered. We yearn for healing; we long for recovery. In this Lenten Season, we turn toward God's healing grace for our physical, communal, mental, intellectual, and environmental health to be restored.

Join us and the team from Worship Design Studio, as each Wednesday evening we explore the healing narratives of Jesus in Matthew 8 and 9. Be reminded that we can begin a journey toward being made whole; while also growing to be more holy. God is making something beautiful and worthwhile in our lives, from that which appears broken, discarded, of little worth. Each week, a different dimension of healing grace.

The image of beach glass, or sea glass, offers us a multifaceted symbol of what Jesus did then – and what God longs to do now.

MISSIONS

Backpack Buddies

Throughout the pandemic kids were still in need of food. Our congregation continued to pack food for Catoctin Elementary school and donate food to Backpack Buddies. As the pandemic continues please don't forget to support this vitally important ministry to hungry children here in Leesburg.

Loudoun Hunger Relief

When our neighbors are hungry, Leesburg UMC responds. We made monthly donations to LHR at the beginning of the month. Admission to our Bible Adventures requiests folks to bring a non-perishable food item for LHR. During Advent, families in our congregation placed food daily under the Christmas tree to collect food for LHR in our first-ever reverse Advent calendar.

Ampersand Pantry Project

Through our pandemic fund, which you all graciously donated to throughout the pandemic, we were able to help pay for lunches for hungry neighbors. Congregants from LUMC not only donated time but themselves in service to the Ampersand Pantry Project volunteering to hand out lunches, diapers, and other donations to those who came through in the middle of the day.

Blossom & Bloom Donation Day

During our stewardship campaign we spent time clearing out the clutter and were able to partner with Blossom and Bloom who graciously accepted our donations. All proceeds from Blossom and Bloom go to help other local area nonprofits that create services and help adults and children with disabilities in our area.

Youth

While our youth could not go on their typical summer mission trip that did not stop them from serving. Throughout the summer and fall the youth went and served at JK Community Farms. They planted and harvested organic fruits and vegetables for local area food banks. They also spent time helping to maintain and care for our local United Methodist Camp Highroad. While the work they did was hard and needed the youth were able to enjoy each other's company safely and give back to their community.

United Methodist Women

The United Methodist Women didn't let the pandemic stop them from caring for their neighbors. The ladies of the UMW early in the pandemic brought lunches and snacks to help show their care and support for the healthcare workers at Heritage Hall. They also continued their tradition of giving Christmas gifts to the residents at Birmingham Green and were ready to meet the need when called upon this December.

Homeless Services Center

Our Neighborhood Groups gave back this December by supplying items for gift bags for 25 male residents at the Loudoun County Homeless Services Center. The gifts included items for cold weather and some sweet treats.

CONGREGATIONAL CARE & CONNECTION

Welcome Baby!

Our congregation welcomed two new baby girls into our community this year. You all made meals for the parents to help them in the best way we could during this pandemic. It's hard to be a parent, especially a new parent, always but the pandemic has tested all parents. The small gift of a meal when welcoming a new baby can be such a huge help.

Caring for the Sick

Outside of the pandemic a lot of need arose to care for our congregation members as they underwent treatments and surgery. It was a tricky task to try and care for folks during a pandemic but you all rose to the occasion. You helped pick up groceries for a member after surgery. You fed a family who fell on hard times during the pandemic while a member went through treatment for cancer. You fed another family right as the pandemic started as their child underwent treatment. Since mid-fall many of you stepped up and offered rides to and from treatment for a member. It would have been easy to use the pandemic as an excuse not to engage but you all have not let it get in your way of caring for your fellow members.

Neighbors Helping Neighbors

At the beginning of the pandemic we were unsure what COVID 19 was and all the risks it would carry for our oldest members. You might remember the great fear older individuals felt, and likely still feel, at having to do simple tasks like grocery shopping or picking up medication. With this in mind we created a task force of over 50 individuals ranging in age from 16 to their early 70's of people willing to help others with those tasks. While we did not find as much need for it because our older members are blessed by the care networks they have formed we are thankful for our members who did step up when called upon.

Neighborhood Groups

At the beginning of summer we wanted to find a way for members to stay connected during the pandemic. We grouped our members and regular attendees over 300 households into geographically located groups. From that we now have 10 functioning Neighborhood Groups that help connect over 50 households and individuals to others in our congregation. The Neighborhood Groups were instrumental in being hosts for outdoor communions and our Neighborhood Group leaders check in monthly to pray with our families. As we move into 2021, with a vaccine which offers us much hope, we hope to continue to utilize these groups to gather, grow, and celebrate in their unique locations.

Faith Friends - College Student Care Packets

We have 19 students in colleges from our congregation and as they headed back to school this fall have continues our practice of sending care packages. The students are grateful to receive these packages as they are a reminder of home and of a congregation that loves them. Faith Friends relies on your donations to be able to include useful items within their packages. Thank you for donating to their cause!

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WORSHIP

Live Streaming Worship

Transitioned fully to online live streaming in a matter of weeks that has allowed us to worship for almost a full year. Eventually, we began offering two in person services weekly one outside and one in the sanctuary. Our Live stream team or Balcony Buddies, as they are sometimes called, have been the driving force behind getting us up and streaming worship well. All our thanks belong with them.

Music

Our musicians created videos for us to sing our favorite hymns and contemporary songs. They created anthems, Michelle weekly has shared her talent with us in worship, and Raising Praise recorded blocks of songs at a time. Kim and her family shared the music of the bells with us. People mixed and blended voices through video to help us gain a sense of normalcy and togetherness through the pandemic.

Outdoor & Virtual Communion

We held outdoor communion service across Leesburg for members to come share at the Lord's Table. After we received the Bishop's permission we were able to offer communion through our virtual services as well.

Creative Worship

We took many of our worship services outside like our remembrance of the Saints on All Saints, Blue Christmas service, and held outdoor evening worship services weekly from August through October.

Easter & Christmas Eve

We celebrated our high holy days in new but familiar ways. We shared in a sunrise Easter service and regular live streamed Easter service. We held four Christmas Eve services, two pre-recorded and two in person. We also had our traditional children's Christmas Pageant in a new way through the Bible Adventure.

Laity Leading

We have tried to include lay involvement in Sunday morning through sharing testimonies, having them read scripture via video, and inviting participation through chats and sending in prayer requests in real time.

Children's Sunday School

Our Children's Sunday School continues to gather virtually on Sunday mornings for music, Bible Story, crafts, science and prayers.




Health and Safety Precautions

They're not just for kids.

Walking with Jesus provides background and introductions to the four Gospels from the time of Jesus' baptism through the bulk of his ministry through video presentations.

On May 29, 2020, Bishop Sharma Lewis asked the question, "When do we as children of God in the second largest annual conference in The United Methodist connection decide to have the crucial conversations and examine our own experiential and inherited stories of race and racism?" The Race and Race Relations Subgroup of the Bishop's Cabinet began work to help answer that question.

On the Virginia Conference website, we have the beginning segments of a video curriculum on Racial Reconciliation designed to help us do what Bishop Lewis has asked of us. The developers are looking for small groups who would be willing to meet, view the prepared videos, engage in "crucial conversations," and in addition to the benefit the group receives, share feedback with the developers to help inform their work.



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

Ash Wednesday

Our season of Lent, beginning with Ash Wednesday, will be different this year. For instance, we are advised not to observe the imposition of ashes for instance. We will mark the beginning of the Lenten Season with a virtual worship experience streamed to your home on Ash Wednesday at 7:00 pm, with music, liturgy, scripture, and message.

In addition, for our Ash Wednesday worship **we will have worship packets available for pick up at the church office.** If you aren't able to pick them up, please let us know and we can mail them to you. These packets will include a small amount of ashes from our past-years palm crosses, instructions for the imposition of ashes, and an order of worship.





Then, during the Lenten Season, *each Wednesday we'll be offering a time of virtual worship*, reflection on, and receiving of God's healing grace for physical health, mental health, community/economic health, environmental health, psychological health, relational health, and more as God invites us to enter a season of recovery and healing from the shattering experiences of this past year. From the gospel of Matthew, we look to the One who "took our infirmities and bore our diseases" (Matthew 8:17b).
