Hope. Springtime. Declining COVID cases. Increasing numbers of those vaccinated. Students back in school, at least partially.


It has been almost a year since we first went into lockdown. I remember making the decision that we were cancelling in-person worship, programs, and activities for the foreseeable future. I naively thought we might be back together soon. And March 14 will mark a year of COVID and the church. Everyone is fatigued – worn out by all of the recommended precautions and restrictions. Week after week, day after day of climbing cases, increasing hospitalizations, and the rising death toll took their toll on our spirits, our emotions, our psyches, our family relationships, and even our faith. Wednesday Worship During Lent

Our Lenten worship on Wednesdays follows the theme of Jesus' ministry of healing in the Gospel of Matthew. Our title: "Holy Vessels – Season of Recovery'

Our scripture foundation:

"We have this treasure in jars of clay..." 2 Corinthians 4:7

"He took our infirmities and bore our diseases" Matthew 8:17b

"Come to me, all who are weary and weighed down, and I will give you rest..."

Matthew 11:28

Each of us is created a precious and holy vessel of embodied love. We have been through a harrowing time since last Lent that has shattered our sense of wholeness—body, mind, and spirit—like a glass vessel fractured into pieces. In this Lenten "season of recovery" for our physical, communal, mental, intellectual, and environmental health, we will explore the healing narratives of Jesus that tell of divine solidarity with human suffering and remind us that we can begin a journey toward making something beautiful from that which is seemingly broken. Giving in Response to Recent Natural Disasters

The United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) responds to natural or civil disasters of such magnitude that they overwhelm a community's ability to recover on its own. Through UMCOR, United Methodists extend loving care to people within the United States. When disaster strikes, it is local churches that provide the first response to their communities. This basic understanding—that disaster response is local—forms the foundation for UMCOR's U.S. disaster training and response.

Third Breakthrough Prayer

In the midst of this pandemic, with news of natural disasters affecting so many, and personal losses affecting us all, we've turned to the Immerse Messiah volume of the Bible for a new Breakthrough Prayer. On the inside of the front cover, the first page contains this prayer which our CLT approved as recommended by our Outreach/ Evangelism Team:

Almighty God, Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, grant we pray that we might be grounded and settled in your truth by the coming of your Holy Spirit into our hearts. What we do not know, reveal to us; What is lacking within us, make complete; That which we do know, confirm in us; and Keep us blameless in your service, Through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

As with our previous Breakthrough Prayers, we commend this one to all in our church family for prayer at 7:14 in the morning, and/or 7:14 in the evening (see 2 Chronicles 7:14). Also, we encourage all of our ministry and administrative teams/committees, small groups, etc., to begin or end their meetings with this prayer.

From the Library

Walk with Jesus on his final day.
Sit beside him at the Last Supper
Pray with him in Gethsemane.
Follow him to the cross.
Desert him. Deny him.

The above heading is a perfect synopsis of Adam Hamilton's book, "24 Hours That Changed the World." Its chapter titles include The Last Supper, The Garden of Gethsemane, Condemned by the Righteous, Jesus, Barabbas, and Pilate, The Torture and Humiliation of the King, The Crucifixion, and Christ the Victor. Each is preceded by scripture relating to the chapter's message. The author states that the book's aim is to "help you better understand the events that occurred during the last twenty-four hours of Jesus' life, see more clearly the theological significance of Christ's suffering and death, and reflect upon the meaning of these events to your life. To do this we will look at the geographical and historical setting of the events, reflect theologically on Jesus' death, and look to see ourselves in the story."

Something that interested me was Hamilton's discussion of several theories of Atonement. This reminded me of a long-ago conversation with a retired pastor who related how she agonized and stumbled over explaining Atonement to a Methodist examining committee of pastors.

What a perfect way to progress through the Lenten season -- reading the unfolding of Christ's crucifixion on to the Resurrection -- and to do so through Adam Hamilton. Visit the church library and see this book on display for check-out.

Those who knew Sharan Hill will remember that she completed seminary and was a pastor. A few of her books are in our library on a shelf (in the corner behind the chair). We believe Sharon would love to share, should you find a book to take home.

for hope when our current hope fades?

The director of an oncology clinic told of a terminally ill young man who came in for his usual treatment. A new doctor who was on duty said to him casually and cruelly, "You know, don't you, that you won't live out the year?"

As the young man left, he stopped by the director's desk and wept. "That man took away my hope," he blurted out.

"I guess he did," replied the director. "Maybe it's time to find a new one."

Commenting on this incident, Lewis Smedes wrote, "Is there a hope when hope is taken away? Is there hope when the situation is hopeless? That question leads us to Christian hope, for in the Bible, hope is no longer a passion for the possible. It becomes a passion for the promise." God's promise. A promise not to remove our trials but rather, a promise to be with us, and to see us through our trials.

Many centuries ago, the prophet Isaiah recorded this assurance from God:

"Do not fear, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by name, you are mine. When you pass through the waters, I will be with you; and through the rivers, they shall not overwhelm you; when you walk through fire you shall not be burned, and the flame shall not consume you. For I am the Lord your God, the Holy One of Israel, your Savior." (Isaiah 43:1b-3a).

Yes, God does save. We think God comes to save us from – our trials, our troubles, our hardships. No, God promises not to save us from, but to save us through. And, to save us for. We do not walk alone. We do not live despairing of the future (or the present) because our plans and programs are gone... As we journey through these days of Winter's finish and into Spring, trust the One who walks with you to bring rains of refreshing, increasing sunlight and warmth of God's presence and love, new growth and ways of bearing witness to the saving grace of God. Our passion for the promise is that God will see us through tornados, ice storms, hurricanes, earthquakes, and even the disasters of our own doing; God will see us to the healing of our divisions, the hope for racial reconciliation, a vital and vibrant witness to God's saving grace in Christ Jesus – Christ who endured the cross before rising again.

Hope springs eternal in our hearts – because we serve a risen Savior.

Grace and peace to you as we continue our Lenten journey. Keep praying for those suffering from COVID and other diseases; for our frontline healthcare workers; for researchers and manufacturers of vaccines; for all who struggle to live with hope.


Have you checked out our Bible Adventures?


