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Message from Pastor Jim: Up in the Air

"Up in the air." These words hit home.

14 days. That's how long the COVID-19 disruption was supposed to last and things would finally settle down. Instead, almost 14 months later, the idiom "up in the air" describes much of our unsettled existence.

"Up in the air" - unsettled, undetermined. This metaphor for unsettled matters floating about like clouds, or perhaps like birds flying in the air, was occasionally put simply as "in the air" until the word "up" was added in the early 1900's. Thomas Jefferson used this phrase in 1797 (Writings) when he wrote: "I consider the future character of our Republic as in the air."

When everything (or much of life) seems up in the air, we naturally look around for solid

Vacation Bible School

We have two weeks of a modified VBS planned for June 21—25 and June 28—July 2. We are reducing numbers from what we've had in the past and changing how we do things to be in compliance with Covid protocols.

Currently, we have over 100 kids registered between the two weeks and only a handful are LUMC families. <u>In fact, most list no church affiliation at all.</u> <u>We have a huge opportunity to connect with these families by sharing God's love with them.</u>

Our groups will be walking to and from the field across from the old hospital to give us more outdoor space (kids won't be vaccinated by June), so we'll need extra supervision in the form of crossing guards and walking buddies. We could use a couple of adults who will be present in the field (you can bring a chair).

A Whole New World

An update from the Worship Team, Team Leader: <u>Rebekah Daugherty</u> (worship@leesburgumc.org)

It's been said that necessity is the mother of invention, and we have certainly experienced the truth of that statement this past year. The nature of the pandemic response also meant we had to adapt quickly. The staff and lay leaders at LUMC, when faced with the necessity of adapting our worship experience to be online, embraced something we had been considering off and on for nearly a decade. And we did it in less than three days! It wasn't perfect but we jumped in, allowing necessity to birth new ways of worshiping together.

Since that first Sunday the Worship Team, Staff, and the newly formed Live Stream Team have been continually experimenting, learning, and adjusting our worship experiences. When software crashed the Live Stream Team spent hours investigating and finding solutions. When we couldn't rehearse and perform music in person our Music Staff learned how to record and mix from home. When we couldn't greet each other in person we made sure we could pass the peace in the chat window and submit prayers via text message. When the weather was nice and restrictions allowed we gathered outdoors to share Communion. Through the seasons of Advent, Christmas, Lent, and Easter (twice), we persevered and we pivoted as we continued to meet new challenges and adapt to changing realities.

As a church we are now looking to the future, wondering what it will bring. We are hopeful that the worst of the pandemic is behind us. We are cautious because of the trauma and loss we have experienced. We are anxious about more uncertainty ahead. As our church and our world emerges from this pandemic, one thing is certain: we are changed and there is no going back.

The past year may have temporarily closed our building and restricted our ability to gather there but it has also thrown open the doors to a whole new world of ministry for our church. If we weren't living in an online world before the pandemic, we most certainly are now. Schools, work places, and businesses have all adapted to restrictions by leveraging online platforms and most are looking to incorporate those new technologies and methods into their operations long term. Likewise, our church has adapted and will now benefit from building on what we have learned and seizing the opportunity to explore new possibilities.

The Worship Team is looking ahead with optimism as we transition out of pandemic restrictions. We are planning to develop both our on-site and our online worship to maximize the impact and reach of our worship ministries. The Team sees both of these platforms as valuable and vital to our church's ministry. There is much work to be done as we envision what our worship experiences will look like moving forward. We

are working on the logistics for both on-site and online worship, and we are committing to extra meetings to work out both the big picture and the details.

As the Worship Team plans the next steps for our worship together we welcome your prayerful support, creative ideas and feedback. We continue to focus on our Team purpose "to create meaningful and memorable worship that connects our congregation to God and to one another." We are excited for the opportunities that lay before us and look forward to what the future holds.

We are continuing and already beginning some of our in-person ministries again. At the same time, we are excited to pray and plan for restarting ministries and beginning anew this fall, as we come forward to church. With more of our members receiving their vaccines, we are seeing more of our members at in-person worship on Sundays, and greater participation in other ministry activities.

In order to stay as safe as possible, we continue to follow the recommendations of the CDC and the direction we have received from the Virginia Annual Conference as we make our plans. Unlike other churches, we have not had any persons contract COVID as a result of church activities. This is a tribute to our staff, volunteers, and each of our members who have taken seriously the safety protocols and the responsibility we each have to keep one another safe. Thank you to all who supported the Bible Adventures over this past year!

Thank you to those who took on acting roles, thank you to those who came and tried a new way of experiencing the biblical narrative, thank you to those who continued to give to the ministries & mission of LUMC that funded this ministry, thank you to those who prayed for LUMC and ministries & mission during this difficult season and offered encouragement to staff and leadership.

How do we make disciples in a pandemic? That was the question these Bible Adventures sought to answer. Discipleship is the process of becoming more like Jesus. That's our mission and purpose (and my job, in particular) – to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world.

In order to grow as disciples of Jesus, our ideas and beliefs of who Jesus is and what it means to be his followers must be challenged on a regular basis. As we get to know Jesus better, we continually unlearn ideas and develop new beliefs. This is part of the transformational process of discipleship. It is through the spiritual discipline of communal Bible study that the Holy Spirit works within us as we wrestle with God and the ideas we were taught previously.

Too often, people walk away from the church once they realize that what they were taught was wrong. We do teach some wrong ideas, but more often, we teach incomplete ideas. We expect the church to provide answers to our questions, but to grow as a disciple, we do not need answers to questions, we need our answers to be questioned. When we seek finite answers, they will always be incomplete and will often lead to wrong conclusions.

Discipleship is not an intellectual exercise, nor is it a matter of following a formula or doing good works. There is no point of mastery. You will never be done; Jesus will always ask you go further, one more mile.

It is my hope and prayer that all who participate in the Bible Adventures this year, were provoked into rethinking some of your ideas of what it means to follow Jesus. What is your post-pandemic discipleship plan? How can I provoke you to rethink what it means for you to live as a follower of Jesus?

LUMC Stories

There's a book in the Church Library that has a unique relationship to our church. The book is The Bible Story (1971) by the best-selling author Pearl S. Buck. The book in our library is not widely read today but the author was quite well known.

Pearl S. Buck was a daughter of missionaries to China early in the 20th century. As an adult, Pearl authored hundreds of fiction and non-fiction books, short stories, and collections. She was awarded a Pulitzer Prize in 1932 and a Nobel Prize in 1938.

The middle initial "S" in her name stands for Sydenstricker. Yes, the Sydenstricker of the Methodist church of the same name close to Springfield, VA. And, yes, the Hubert Sydenstricker who was Pearl's uncle who pastored Leesburg church from 1915 – 1919.

ground, for anchors, for something stable.

What in your life captures and demonstrates the essence of this phrase and feeling? What has been most unsettling for you and for your family? Where, and how, have you felt the disconnection(s) brought on by COVID-19? School? Home? Work? Decisions about your future?

For my wife and I, getting our home ready to sell* fits the bill. Much of our lives unsettled before because of COVID-19, the unknowns of preparing to sell our home settled us squarely in the land of unsettled for the past few months.

So what about you?

In his book, **A Time to Heal**, J. R. Briggs writes about the importance of listening to, and telling, our stories. "Stories have healing power because stories connect us." As we search for solid ground, know that you are not alone. I am not alone. We are not alone. We have a community that cares. That prays. That listens. That shares. In our unsettledness, it was, and is, the encouragement of those who have listened, who have shared, and who have prayed, that has enabled us to feel solid ground beneath our feet

While the Easter Season reminds us of the meta-narrative of the resurrection and all the reasons we have to dance, our individual narratives may make it difficult for us some days, or even most days, to feel like dancing. Therein lies the blessing of community. Of connection. Of caring and sharing. Inviting one another to the dance floor of grace.

Feeling like some, much, or all of life is "up in the air"? May the promises of scripture and the presence of Christ through one another in community help provide firm footing as we walk through these days.

"There is no one like the God of Israel. He rides across the heavens to help you, across the skies in majestic splendor. The eternal God is your refuge, and his everlasting arms are under you. He drives out the enemy before you... So Israel will live in safety, prosperous Jacob in security, in a land of grain and new wine, while the heavens drop down dew. (Deuteronomy 33:26-28 NLT)

The Lord is my light and my salvation, so why should I be afraid? The Lord is my fortress – the stronghold of my life – protecting me from danger, so why should I tremble? (Psalm 27:1 NLT)

"'For I know the plans I have for you,' declares the Lord, 'plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future. Then you will call on me and come and pray to me, and I will listen to you." (Jeremiah 29:11-12)

Keep dancing (and singing!) – even in the rain!
