Message from Pastor Jim: Courageous Hope

Max Lucado reminds us that "The 'manger' dares us to believe that the best is yet to be."¹ We dare to believe because the incarnation of God in Jesus leads us to the reconciling atonement of God in Jesus that we remember during Holy Week. And, while that week ends in death, the week that follows begins with resurrection! The manger is where we begin the retelling of this story; the remembering of the message; the renewing of life and hope. "The best is yet to be"²!

Through the story of the manger, God calls to us, inviting us to immerse ourselves in hope. The hope of our Christian faith is not "wishful fancy." In faith we dare to believe that God, who brought forth the miracle of Christ in the manger, continues through history the work of redemption and reconciliation – bringing forgiveness and cleansing of sin, and authentic welcoming community. Advent Traditions – Jesse Tree and Advent Wreath

The word Advent means "coming" and refers to the coming of Jesus. There are many Advent traditions enjoyed by Christians around the world. One of these, the Advent Jesse Tree, emphasizes God coming in the flesh at Bethlehem nearly two thousand years ago. The symbols and the readings for each day draw our attention to his life and ministry, using 25 symbols from the Old and New Testaments. They help guide us to also anticipate his second coming in glory, when the fulness of God's salvation will be revealed for all of humankind. Advent prepares us to celebrate both of these "comings." The symbols trace the heritage of Jesus Christ from the beginning of creation. We have our own LUMC Jesse Tree devotional, along with daily symbols on magnets and a "tree" to put them on. Pick yours up at church.

In addition, many Protestant and Catholic churches use an Advent wreath with the lighting of candles, one for each of the weeks of Advent, to symbolize Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love that come wrapped in Christ. You can make your own Advent wreath to use in the home. It can be large or small, and should be in a prominent location where the family gathers; perhaps at the dining table or in the family room. The first lighting of the candle for the week takes place on Sunday. It can be accompanied by a brief responsive reading from the Sunday service by members of the family, either at the beginning of the day or in the evening. Monday through Saturday, the candle lighting can also be joined with the reading of the Jesse Tree devotional and placing that day's symbol magnet on the tree.

A simple, easy, Advent "Wreath"

4 Votive Candles (all purple or 3 purple and 1 pink) to represent hope, peace, joy (pink), and love.

1 Pillar Candle (white to symbolize Christ)

Large plate to accommodate the 4 candles in a circle, with the pillar candle in the center.

The plate can be decorated with live greens, although this is not necessary.

Begin using your Advent Wreath on December 1 and continue through Christmas Day as your family takes time each day to focus on the greatest Gift ever given!

Connecting Over the Holidays

Last spring through the sermon series, *The Art of Neighboring*, our congregation was introduced to the concept of "Neighboring." Neighboring is when we make an intentional effort to build relationships with our literal neighbors. We learned that most Americans don't know the names of, let alone details about, their neighbors.

As Christians, we too often think that loving our neighbor is metaphorical, and we think we can fulfill that obligation by donating to Loudoun Hunger Relief or Back Pack Buddies or Salvation Army or Operation Christmas Child. When we think our neighbor is someone far away, not in our every day life, we miss the opportunity to engage with God. God desires that we will learn to love our literal neighbors—yes, the ones right outside our door!

If you don't know the families that live around you, there is no better time than the holidays to get started on this holy task. Below are some tips and suggestions on how to start Neighboring—engaging meaningfully and building relationships with those right outside your door.

- Happy Holidays Package: Make some holiday treats, create an ornament, put together a hot cocoa kit, or purchase a small gift (like scented hand soap and a holiday hand towel) and take them to your neighbors as a gift. Be sure to include a card with your name and the names of your family members so they get the opportunity to know them too. And don't just leave the package on their doorstep; be sure to knock and introduce yourself or your family personally. This may take a few tries but it's important to make that face to face connection.
- **Candy Caning**: Maybe you know your neighbors names but you're having a hard time moving past the friendly hellos in your driveway. You can have the youth decorate their yard in festive Candy Canes for a few days; make sure to let Angela know that you don't want the surprise to be anonymous! Neighbors with young kids are especially likely to enjoy this treat. It's a great ice breaker, and it helps our youth raise funds for their summer mission trip. (see page 5)
- Host a Holiday Hot Chocolate Bar for the Santa Rides: Every year Santa comes through Leesburg on a fire truck to wave to the kids. Find out which night he's coming through your neighborhood and invite your neighbors over for some warm beverages, like hot chocolate and apple cider, about 30 minutes before he makes his appearance. It's a brief way to practice hospitality without having to throw a big party. Give people disposable coffee mugs so they can take their warm beverages with them as they wait for Santa to come by!
- **Cookie Party at Church**: If you think your neighbor might be interested in church but the thought of inviting them to worship makes you, or them, nervous, then consider inviting them to our Cookie Party on December 22nd. It will be a low key way for them to experience our church environment without the pressure of a worship service. Make sure to help them register for the event and accompany them to the event. Our church can be intimidating to new comers; Wesley Hall and Asbury Hall

Reflections on Darcy: Traditions Old and New

Did you know that one of our former youth, Darcy Pierce, recently had a movie that she worked on released on Netflix?

Santa Girl is a Hallmark Christmas movie that was filmed at Shenandoah University and around Winchester. Darcy served as an executive director and appears in several scenes throughout the film. This past weekend, I traveled to the Fall Retreat with our youth, and I asked several of our high school girls if they were aware of Darcy's movie. They weren't and they also shared that they didn't remember Darcy, although they remembered hearing her name when they were in middle school.

Their time in youth group did not overlap with Darcy's, so Darcy is no longer part of the shared memory of the group. That makes me sad because I remember when Darcy would tag along on the ski trip as a fourth or fifth grader because her dad chaperoned. Darcy was also the youth representative when a few of us gathered to discuss starting a youth worship service; she was just starting high school then. Today we are still using the general format that we developed back then to reach Darcy and her peers but now I must consider whether we need to reevaluate that format.

Even as I reflect on our youth ministry and the traditions that have brought us to today, I am forced to ask myself whether we continue doing something only so that a few people (myself, in this case) can remember something that happened once (those happy times when Darcy was one of our youth). Is this tradition being continued to help me remember something else, or does the practice have deeper meaning that is still helpful in moving others toward maturity in Christ?


This year, outside forces caused a few of our youth traditions to end: SPY and separate Fall Retreats (middle schoolers vs. high schoolers). In their places, new

traditions were born that will help foster community for new youth who have little connection to the past.

Letting go of favorite traditions can be painful because we feel we are also being forced to let go of the memories of those we love, memories attached to those traditions. But we must make space for new generations to create new traditions so that they, too, can create new life and pass on the mission of sharing God's love with the world they live in.

The basic structure of our youth ministry program was developed by the sixth through ninth graders during a retreat in 2005, the same month that one of those current ninth graders who doesn't remember Darcy, was born. As I look at our current middle school kids, who have no memory of a youth group that didn't meet in the AG, I have to remember that what worked for the Class of 2009 was shaped by a world that the Class of 2025 never knew.

This spring, I am would like to especially invite all of our middle school youth to a retreat to help us redefine what our youth ministry should look like today. March 14-15, all middle school students should plan to participate in this special retreat. High school students are encouraged as well, so you can pass forward what has been meaningful for you over the years.








Operation Christmas Child Shoeboxes

• **Invite them to Christmas Eve**: If you have a relationship with your neighbors, you know their names, and feel comfortable with them, then invite them to one of our Christmas Eve services. Don't just list off the service times; invite them instead to come with you and your family. Tell them which service you attend and what you love about it. Offer to carpool with them to church and sit with them in the service. Ask them if they have any questions. Follow up a few days later to thank them for going with you and to invite them with you the next time you go to church.

I hope you will use some of these ideas to connect with your neighbors. The end goal isn't to make them members at LUMC, the end goal is for them to see Christ in you. That won't ever happen if you don't know them! Go out knowing that Christ goes before you to make a way, the Holy Spirit will empower you, and God will be with you as you do the holy work of loving your neighbors. ~ *Rev. Heather Wray*

Our Way Forward Together: Preparing for General Conference, 2020

SAVE THE DATES: January 26, February 9, May 31

Many are aware that the United Methodist General Conference meets next May, 2020, and will once again take up the issues of Lesbian and Gay sexuality and inclusion, along with how the United Methodist Church may move forward knowing the deep and painful division over these issues. United Methodists world-wide hold differing opinions on the issues of gay/heterosexual marriage, ordination, and what local churches/clergy can and cannot do with respect to celebrating gay marriage. The General Conference, comprised of delegates from the global UM Church, is the official voice of United Methodism. It is charged with establishing the mission, priorities, processes, and parameters of our ministry together worldwide.

Knowing that the decisions of this (and every) General Conference will impact local churches, please put the above dates on your calendar, as we prepare and pray for GC 2020.

In particular, **on January 26**, we will hold a town hall conversation with two Virginia Conference clergy who are, or have been, delegates to General Conference; followed by a time for theological reflection and discussion. Our two presenters are the Rev. Rob Vaughn and the Rev. Keith Boyette. We have asked them to share 1) what they anticipate and expect, leading up to the Conference, 2) what we can do to prepare leading up to and following the Conference, and 3) how we can effectively pray.

Our primary focus through all of these discussions continues to be how we can effectively and genuinely "make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world". The delightful paradox of disciple making is that in the process we, too, undergo transformation as the wind of the Holy Spirit continues to stir – and sometimes stir up.



In the next few weeks, the NLI Hospitality Task Force will be at work making Wesley Hall even more hospitable as the holiday season gets under way. Here are some of the new things to look for in the coming weeks:

- A photo gallery wall, featuring pictures of our congregation fellowshipping together, serving together, and worshipping together over the past year, will be located next to the archives room. This location is meant to signify that we are a church with a significant and meaningful past, a vibrant present, and a hopeful future.
- A chest/console to serve as an information center for sign ups, hand outs, and other items that used to be located at the Just Ask Desk will be added. The drawers will store convenience items for use in Wesley Hall, such as the DVD player/ cable for the television, pens, clipboards, etc. Find this new info center below the Wesley TV.
- A historical gallery wall, featuring photos of our church history, will be laid out on the wall that adjoins the Narthex. The glass-topped display will also de relocated to serve as an anchor for the historical photos. - **Conversation areas are being furnished in two corners** of Wesley Hall where people can sit to enjoy their coffee and conversation on Sunday mornings. The new furnishings include some light-weight arm chairs that can easily be moved out of the room if needed, yet are more formal and substantial than folding chairs . We also have new black occasional tables to place coffee and snacks on while they sit.

We hope that you will enjoy these improvements to Wesley Hall. We have taken care to listen to each other throughout this process as we have discerned what was needed to amplify the beauty and functionality of this room. We were thoughtful as we chose items that enhance the beauty of the space and respect and honor its historical significance. We believe that Wesley Hall is the hub of our hospitality on Sunday mornings, and we hope that these changes will help create an even more welcoming atmosphere for you and all our guests.
