

## **Christian Formation: STEAM on Sundays**

#### Making church more engaging, purposeful, and relevant

You might have noticed that our attendance *Imagine* kids telling their friends that and participation levels have been declining Sunday school is cutting edge and the best over the past several years, particularly among children and youth (and their families).

#### What's going on?

There are a lot of things going on, but there's a little secret that we don't always like to talk about: church can be boring (shhh... don't tell anyone).

What's the difference between when we were kids and today? There are other options on Sunday-more engaging, purposeful, and seemingly more relevant options. Going to church is not going to help kids get into college.

#### So, how do we make church more engaging, purposeful, and relevant?

**Imagine** kids coming and exploring Bible stories through robotics. Imagine that instead of putting on a little skit, they create a stop-animation video or construct the village of Capernaum from all sorts of odds and ends over several weeks.

**Imagine** kids wanting to come to Sunday school and gaining a deeper understanding of the stories and traditions than word search puzzles could ever provide.

part of their week. Imagine kids recruiting friends to come and work on projects with them.

**Consider** that this approach is no more expensive to maintain than buying the printed curriculum packets that end up in the trash.

*Imagine* reaching kids through summer camps that prepare them for college while they learn the classic Bible stories and church traditions.





## **Backpack Buddies**

Backpack Buddies will meeting on **March 1 after the 8:30 am service in Wesley Hall** to fill 240 bags of food for the Catoctin Elementary School children. **Everyone** is invited to come and join us. These bags of food will be given weekly to the students in need to provide them with breakfast, lunch and dinner over the weekend.

The Backpack Buddies program will continue to meet on the first Sunday in April and May after the 8:30 am service in Wesley Hall (unless otherwise noted) to pack bags of food. Your help with this Mission is greatly appreciated!

SA little history of the program: the Backpack Buddies Program was started in Loudoun County in 2011 by Galilee UMC to help feed the local elementary school children who are part of the reduced or free lunch program and who have limited availability for food over the weekends. Our church joined the program in 2012 as an ongoing Missions program to help provide meals for these children.

#### **How You Can Help**

There are several ways you can help support the Backpack Buddies program:

## **Lent and Easter Special Offering**

This year, half of our special Lent and Easter Offering will go to Loudoun Homeless Services Center (LUMC's Signature Mission) and half to missionary support. Here's a little information about each.

#### **Loudoun Homeless Services Center**

The Loudoun Homeless Services Center (LHSC) is a multifaceted program that provides extensive services to prevent, support and help end homelessness within Loudoun and surrounding counties. The Loudoun Homeless Services Center is a program operated by Volunteers of America Chesapeake & Carolinas and Loudoun County Family Services. The primary goals are to assist households from homelessness to permanent housing, and prevent at-risk households from becoming homeless. The program staff utilize evidence based practices such as trauma informed care, motivational interviewing, housing first approaches, and low barrier programming to motivate, empower and support households experiencing homelessness.

#### **Missionaries**

<u>Delbert and Sandy Groves</u> are a United Methodist missionary couple with the General Board of Global Ministries based in Kitwe, Zambia and serve at the New Life Center. The center, established in 2001 through Delbert and Sandy's efforts, has grown into a resource for the young United Methodist Provisional Conference of Zambia. It has numerous outreach ministries, including New Life Press, health education, PET Zambia (handicap bikes for mobility), a learning and computer lab, English instruction, instruction in new church construction, and other training ministries. Additional information is available online at <a href="https://www.NewLifeZambia.com">www.NewLifeZambia.com</a>. The couple also hosts volunteer-in-mission work teams.



<u>Dan and Kaylynn Mills</u> work with the Pacific Islands Regional Team based in Auckland, New Zealand. Dan and Kaylynn are aunt and uncle to Sean Daugherty (a member of LUMC).

Their job is to give direction & focus to their Papua New Guinea ministry (as acting National Directors) — encouraging, advising, training, and mentoring the staff (and key volunteers). They do this through visits and weekly phone calls from New Zealand. For the past 28 years, they've been working in the Pacific Islands; living in Palau, Guam, Fiji, and the Solomon Islands, and for the past 14 years, in New Zealand. Papua New Guinea has over 830 different languages (and cultures), and it's a huge challenge to reach every peoplegroup. Their strategy is to work on the University campus, especially the University of Papua New Guinea (UPNG) in Port Moresby. The university acts like a magnet drawing the best & brightest from every people group in the country (at least 836) using one language, English. ## **Pillars of Lent-Family Devotional**

During the season of Lent, we invite you to share a family devotional adapted from Faithful Families: Creating Sacred Moments at Home, by Traci Smith, called "Three Pillars of Lent." This is an active/interactive and individually tailored Lenten devotional centered on the three traditional Lenten practices of Prayer, Fasting, and Alms-Giving.

For each of the three practices, you decide together as a family, or with a spiritual friend,

how you will observe that practice for each of the 40 days of the Lenten season. We'll give you enough guidance and creative suggestions to get started.

Instruction booklets are available at church or <u>as a PDF on our website</u>. For the Alms-giving activity, we have bags of bingo chips available to pick up, or you might use a bag of dried beans.

## Lent and Easter Worship: "Come to the Table"

Come to the Table! – In scripture, the sharing of a meal was a sign of hospitality, friendship, celebration, and even covenantal relationship. The observance of the Passover meal by the Jewish people exemplified all of these. It also communicated through words and through food the deliverance of the Israelites from slavery in Egypt.

The Mishnah (oral teachings based on the Torah/Law) requires that everyone who participates in the Passover meal see themselves as "one who has come out of Egypt," i.e., one in need of deliverance from slavery to sin. The early Christian church incorporated this tradition and theme in their shared meals in which sinners and saints were invited to eat together and where they learned about Jesus through their sharing of the gospel story, along with each other's stories. Long before there were cathedrals there was the Christian community gathered in each other's homes, sharing a meal, and celebrating the deliverance from sin gained through the death and resurrection of Jesus, the Messiah. This was the primary vehicle for the transmission of the gospel and the amazing growth of the early church.

Today, we are recovering this basic practice of sharing our faith by way of a meal, coming to the table invited by Jesus. We'll come to the table Sunday mornings with a focus on what happened during several meals recorded in the gospel of Matthew, and for our traditional observance of Holy Communion.

We'll also come to the table Sunday evenings at 5 pm\* for an even more ancient observance of Holy Communion in the context of a shared meal, also looking to the same scripture from Sunday morning. The 5 pm gathering is called "Dinner Church" - see the description on <a href="mailto:page 10">page 10</a>. Dinner Church oriented to those who cannot make it Sunday morning and for those who want to invite their friends to an informal worship experience that incorporates food, music, and conversation; all are welcome!

## **Message from Pastor Jim: Destination: Resurrection!**

We are in the season of Lent, with 39 days left to reach our destination – the Resurrection. Each of the gospel writers record different details about that event, yet they all agree on the most important detail: an empty tomb and a resurrected Christ!

During, and in the days following the crucifixion, Jesus' followers were seemingly rudderless. Some were fearful. Some were bold to be near the cross. Some were hesitant, looking on from a distance. On the day of Resurrection, the responses of his followers varied. Some were still bound by their fear. Others were doubtful. Some were oblivious to his presence, not recognizing him. Some fell down and worshiped.

What little we know of the ensuing days reveals that this group of disciples and other followers gradually coalesced into a unified and identifiable community of believers. I can imagine they had many discussions, many questions, and not a few disagreements. Some probably left, although this is not recorded. Yet many continued together, and those who did received a remarkable gift at the feast of Pentecost, that gave them courage, guidance, and clarity to move forward, continuing the message of the kingdom of God come near in Christ; a kingdom opened to all and welcoming any who came repenting, believing, and desiring forgiveness and new life in Christ! All of this took about 50 days, from Easter to Pentecost.

We celebrate Easter this year on April 12; Pentecost arrives on May 31. Fifty days. In between, the United Methodist Church will hold their quadrennial General Conference, May 5–15, a gathering of 862 delegates from United Methodist churches around the world, half clergy and half laity. I find it more than coincidental that this is the "2020" General Conference, and that this conference may well mark a watershed moment in the worldwide Methodist movement begun almost 300 years ago by

the brothers and Revs. John and Charles Wesley.

I am praying, as many of you are, that those attending this General Conference have 20-20 vision to clearly discern God's purpose for the United Methodist Church with respect to our divided opinions regarding the inclusion of LGBTQ+ persons within and without our churches. We cannot see now what those decisions will be; nor can we fully discern their impact upon our church. We can, however, choose to trust that Jesus meant what he said, "Upon this rock I will build my church" (Matthew 16:18). Whether Jesus meant Peter's statement of faith (v.16), or Peter himself, the primary point is that Jesus is the one building. Not us. Not our statements of belief, important as they are. Jesus. We can choose to lean on and lean into his real presence with us via the Holy Spirit: the Comforter, Advocate, Counselor, Spirit-oftruth Jesus promised (John 14, 16).

Like Jesus' first followers after the crucifixion and even after Easter, we will experience varied responses and reactions following our 2020 General Conference.

Anxiety. Courage. Confusion. Clarity.

Disorientation. Doubt. Faith. Hope. All of these are normal and natural reactions to change. Yes, change. It's coming. Like Good Friday. Like Easter! We can choose to focus on fear and death (crucifixion); or we can focus on hope and new life (Easter). I have chosen the latter. I am praying the latter.

**Destination: Resurrection!**
