



A Message from Pastor Jim

Every year of my pastoral ministry, I've had to adjust to the changing date of Easter. Every year. Mid-April, early April, late March. It has not always been easy because of my lingering pre-Christ stubbornness, but in recent years, I have come to appreciate this peculiar feature of the most important day on the Christian Calendar.

First, the changing date of Easter reminds me that the resurrected Christ comes to change me. All of me. He comes to change the world. A church member wrote me a lengthy letter several years ago arguing for the need to "rewrite the Bible so that it reflects our modern mindset and values". His appeal was not simply to bring an up-to-date hermeneutic to our reading and applying of scripture, he advocated a total rewrite. Change God's word to make it more appealing, less demanding. His words evoked a realization that I am - we are – tempted to "re-make God in our image". The small outpost of rebels in my soul still struggles to convince me that I don't need to change. Easter reminds me that I do. In fact I must. Change. I cannot control the resurrected Christ any more than I can control the moving date of the Resurrection. I am the one who must adjust and allow the resurrected Christ to change me.

Second, the changing date of Easter reminds me that I am on a journey with Christ. To journey means to be headed somewhere, with a destination in mind. That destination is clear – the kingdom of heaven. I dare not homestead somewhere short of the goal, no matter how tempting. I dare not get so set in my ways that I stop growing, learning, or being open to wonder. To be on a journey with Christ is to always be moving spiritually – moving onward, upward, inward, outward, forward. The resurrected Christ is on the move. If I want his dust to cover me¹, I need to stay close and stay connected.

Third, a changing Easter reminds me that God uses others to change me – and uses me to change others. You, too. We are in the great company of Christ-followers all over the world – and all throughout time. This is not, and never can be, a solitary trek. We are built for relationships – for church. Authentic relationships change us; sometimes painfully. But with every splinter from the cross comes a ray of healing and hope through resurrection.

Our journey through Lent points to a destination: Easter. Resurrection. New life. Reconstruction, not remodeling. And as we've been discovering along the way, the resurrected Christ prepares a banquet table for you, me, anyone; wherever we are: in worship, "in the presence of my enemies", in joyful times, in the dark days of grief, in youth, in old age, in our birthing, and in our dying. God's table is set. There's a place for you. The invitation is given.

So, when is Easter next year? I don't know at the moment, but I do know when it is this year – Sunday, April 21. Wherever you are that day, I pray you experience the joy of resurrection! 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"Sundays in Summer," One Worship Service Together, 9:30 am

"Sundays in Summer" is our Summer worship schedule that will consist of a single service at 9:30 am from June 16th through September 1st. This schedule was developed in light of our mission and vision as a church, and responding to the felt and real needs of our church family.

Its purpose: To grow together through the experience of community in worship to be the Church.

Reasons for the Change

- Many have expressed the desire to get to know others in our church family who worship at different times.
- Sunday morning is the one time when the majority of our church family come together for worship, serving, fellowship and spiritual growth.
- During the summer months, attendance dips and the diminished presence of others worshipers affects our experience of worship. Gathering all together creates a more energetic atmosphere of worship.
- Many miss being together for intergenerational worship, for at least part of the service.
- Many feel the need to build deeper relationship with others that go beyond mere acquaintance.

Key Considerations

Reaching new people: Inviting people to a new experience of Sunday mornings at LUMC where the presence of more people in worship together creates an energy and greater felt presence of God. In contrast to our typical Sunday worship, guests will see children, youth and adults all worshiping together.

Making disciples: We believe that discipleship is grounded in relationship. We will sharpen our focus on this aspect of our vision and being more intentional about getting to know one another. Clergy and Lay staff will have the potential to teach/lead during the discipleship time, and thus be in conversation with discussion groups. They will get to build relationships also!

Moving toward our Vision: It will focus us on being "One with Each Other", with an emphasis on what it means to be the church, and on spiritual gifts. We will also join in community service two times (June 16th and Sept 1st)

Experiencing community in worship in ways that help us be the Church: Trust the staff and ministry teams to plan, as we always do, and that they will take all legitimate concerns into consideration. Any and all are welcome to be part of our ministry teams that are doing this planning!

Sundays In Summer: FAQs

Frequently Asked Questions

1. What is "Sundays In Summer"?

It is a plan to bring those who worship in our four worship services together in one worship service each of the Sundays In Summer, from 9:30 to 10:30 AM. This will be followed by a time of fellowship and then small groups/Sunday school for children, youth, and adults.



2. Why are we doing this?

The purpose behind Sundays in Summer is to help

the members of LUMC to "Grow together through the experience of community in worship to be 'The Church' together." We believe that by bringing our entire church family together for worship, this will make it easier to create opportunities to grow and strengthen relationships with one another.

3. When does this start and end?

Sundays in Summer will begin June 16th and continue through September 1st. Our regular Sunday morning schedule will resume on September 8th.

4. What style of worship will be used?

Yes! That is to say, we will have a variety of music. Some weeks we will have all traditional worship, other weeks will be all contemporary worship. Some Sundays we will have a blend of both or perhaps something new. But all of our worship will be carefully and prayerfully planned to help us experience the presence of God as we sing, pray, speak, listen, and share together.

5. Will children and youth be with adults in worship?

Everyone will begin in worship together. During the sermon time, those children who would like to, may be given the option to leave adult worship for a children's activity. Our youth may also have a youth option as well. This is still being worked out. Nursery-aged children can always be dropped off in the nursery before worship, or at any time during worship.

6. How will this affect Sunday school & Disciple Groups?

Adult Sunday school classes and disciple groups can choose to meet either before or after worship, as the group decides. We will also have a couple of summertime "Grow and Go" options lead by our clergy who are looking forward to participating in this way on Sunday mornings.

Stay tuned for more FAQs to come:

- Will there be enough handicap parking?
- Will I be able to find a place to park since we're all coming at thee same time?
- What if my work schedule means I'll now miss Sunday worship?
- Can we try this just for a month? Or can we just do this the first Sunday in July, August, and September?
- What happens if either I cannot come at 9:30, or I choose not to come because it is too much of a change?

Worship after Easter: "The Art of Neighboring"

When Jesus was asked to sum up the Torah (The Law) into one command, he said to love God with everything we have and to love our neighbors as ourselves. We have turned this foundational concept of loving our neighbors into a nice saying. But what did Jesus mean when he said, "and you shall love your neighbor as yourself"? Where did he get this idea from, anyway? We must also ask, "Can we take Jesus' command literally?" And, what might happen in our community, our schools, our places of work, our families, and our church, if all of us did?

When Jesus was asked to limit the concept of neighbor, he instead expanded it to include even a despised enemy of the Jews ("a Samaritan" - Luke 10:25-37). Our mission, should we choose to accept it, is to step out of our comfort zones, expand our understanding of "who is my neighbor?", learn more fully what Jesus' command means for us today, and put it into practice. Those who do will undergo change; and you will be an active partner with Christ in helping to change the world. "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." This was not a suggestion.

 April 28 – Art of Neighboring #1 – "He Arose! Wonderful! So What's Next?" Matthew 28:16-20; Acts 17:22-34 The call to neighboring is really quite simple. Taking this seriously will

change your life and transform our community.

 May 5 – Art of Neighboring #2 – "Confessions of an ADD Christian" Mark 5:21-43, Holy Communion
 In order to take God's call seriously, we must create space in our lives to build relationships with those who live near us.

Praying for One Another - Lent, 2019

There is still time to join in prayer for the remainder of Lent!

This year during Lent, will you commit with me to <u>pray daily</u> for at least five other members of our church family - including children, youth, and non-members who are active? Through scripture readings, daily reflections, and prayer promptings, you will find yourself growing in your praying, AND as a disciple in specific ways: in **compassion**; **respect** for others; **thoughtfulness** or mindfulness; **mutuality**; **personal awareness**; **self-discipline**; **determination**; and **patience**. These are "**Eight Walks**" through which Christ works to change us.

HERE'S HOW

Choose a pack of envelopes and cards with the names of 5 (or more) individuals who are part of our church family*. Pick up a daily prayer guide, <u>Praying for One Another</u>. Pray daily for those named on the cards; use the blank card for a friend or neighbor you would like to invite to church for Easter.

During Holy Week, the final week of Lent, write a short note on the cards provided to each person for whom you've been praying, and mail it to them.

My prayer – and the goal of this spiritual discipline – is **to have everyone in our church family** praying daily, and everyone in our church family prayed for daily.

(* cards and prayer guides are available in the sanctuary and at the Just Ask Desk. You may join this spiritual discipline at any point during Lent.)

House Calls and Holy Communion-On-Going

Each week during Lent, a member of our pastoral staff or our Director of Discipleship will be available to visit with you in your home. Our desire is simply this: to connect with the families/ individual members of our church family in "your space"; to pray together; and to share in the sacrament of Holy Communion with you.

Rev. Wishmyer, Rev. Wray, Wayne Reynolds (Certified Lay Minister), and Angela Becek (Director of Discipleship Ministries), have blocked off time for three "home visits" each, each week, in addition to regular responsibilities, as part of our spiritual discipline for Lent.

Each visit will be 45-55 minutes in length, and can include just you, or also extended family members you would like to invite, or another family/couple/individual you would like to include. The format will be simple: Introductions as needed, brief devotional, listening and sharing family concerns, prayer, Holy Communion, blessing of the home.

We are preparing a schedule that will show available time slots throughout the Lenten season, and you are invited to sign up for one based on the time that best suits you and your family. The days and times available will vary some week to week.

From the Library

The Trellis and the Seed and Bathed in Prayer

In spite of our recent mercurial weather, where one enjoyed the 70's, perhaps followed by temperatures low enough to produce snow and ice, our thoughts are now turning to the earth...to planting. Linda Robey, a Master Gardener, has found a book in our library that opens the gardening door --<u>The Trellis and the Seed. A Book of Encouragement for All Ages</u>. Author, Jan Karon, writes about the beauty that can be found in everyday miracles. It is also a parable "about the rewards that come from being a little bit different from everyone else."

Linda writes..... "In the library on the shelf with the Jan Karon books is a book by her called <u>The</u> <u>Trellis and the Seed</u>. This is a great book for anyone that gardens and particularly if they garden with children. The story walks one through the process of a small seed becoming a large flowering vine. This particular seed is for a moonflower vine.

I have grown moonflowers for a number of years. The buds (which look like unicorn horns) unfurl in the late afternoon and become beautiful white flowers. Several days after 9-11, I watched as a special bud slowly unwrapped to become a lovely white flower. I felt as though God was telling me we would somehow heal from this terrible disaster.

This is a perfect book to use when introducing children to the magic of a seed becoming a flower. I think you will enjoy the beautiful illustrations." (Note: The moonflower photos are from the Robey's garden.)

Bathed In Prayer, Father Tim's Prayers, Sermons, and Reflections from the Mitford Series. Author: Jan Karon. The LUMC library presently has nineteen of Karon's books. Her latest is quietly revealing as she writes about her personal faith journey during which time she learned to bathe her work in prayer. She suggests that we bathe our work and our enemies in prayer. For twenty-one years I have been reading about the ficticious Father Tim Kavanagh, the sixty- something Episcopal rector who eventually retired from The Lord's Chapel in a small village in the mountains of North Carolina. This petite red book gathers some of the favorite Mitford moments in Karon's books, offering the reader Christmas sermons, marriage ceremonies, humble prayers, funerals and just plain life events. It's soul-soothing and a spirit-lifter.

Love Thy Neighbor

During Lent, our youth focus on more opportunities to practicing loving their neighbors with activities like the 30 Hour Famine and TOP.

During the 30 Hour Famine (March 15-16), our youth spent 24 hours at church gaining new understanding of the hardships that extreme poverty cause millions.

Through Teens Opposing Poverty (TOP) our youth prepare meals and go into DC (March 10th) to distribute bags of food and socks while consciously choosing to acknowledging the humanity of those they serve .







REACH Roanoke (a.k.a. U-SPY)

July 6- 12

This year, our youth will be participating in REACH Roanoke instead of SPY for their summer mission trip. Our youth who visited REACH in December dubbed it "U-SPY" for Urban SPY. REACH works much more closely with local agencies to connect with the people who most need help in the community. Students will have the opportunity to work on homes, as they did with SPY, but also to work in the homeless shelter, the local food pantry, and the animal shelter. They would also be given the opportunity, if they chose, to run a VBS for the neighborhood kids.

A couple of things that make REACH very different from SPY are:

- It is year-round. They have groups come on weekends that continue the work all year.
- They have a year-round staff which adds continuity and maintains relationships in the community.
- It is in a different building and a different city.
- It is more urban; groups will not have long drives to their work sites.
- They buy abandoned homes, fix them up, work with the bank and community organizations to make sure deserving families are able to purchase the homes.
- Evening programming takes place out in the community

2019 General Conference - What's Next?

It has been over a month since our United Methodist Bishops and U. M. Church leaders from around the world met for the 2019 special "called" General Conference. By most estimations, the ultimate objective of the conference: "...to explore options to strengthen church unity" remains unfulfilled. Because of constitutional questions regarding the legislation that was passed, we will have to wait until the Judicial Council review at the end of April (23-25). Some, or all, of the legislation, may not be approved. In addition, we will have our next regular General Conference in May, 2020 – barely 13 months from now – in Minneapolis, Minnesota. In the meantime, many will be watching what happens as Annual Conferences meet late Spring and early Summer to elect delegates to the 2020 General Conference, and act on recommendations and petitions to be forward to the General Conference.

We, and United Methodists around the world, prayed for General Conference. We prayed for many things but ultimately for God's will to be accomplished for the United Methodist Church. Our ongoing challenge, sisters and brothers, regardless of how we felt about the result is to look for the signs that God's will is being accomplished. We are reminded with every election that God's will is not limited to or by the final vote tally.

Our Bishop Sharma Lewis urged us to focus on the many ways in which God continues to be at work in and through the United Methodist Church. Many are seeing God at work through a greater awareness of LGBTQ+ inclusion in our churches – and how far we have to go. Many are seeing God at work inspiring them to work for change. Many are seeing God at work testing the genuineness of our love for one another within the Church. Many are seeing God at work reminding us that every "issue" we discuss and debate has a human face; a personal story. Many are seeing God at work in a renewed determination to be more welcoming of all. And, many are seeing God as work as we make room for honest, open, humble, and caring dialogue – we are not alone. There is certainly so much more for "those who have eyes to see".

For our part at LUMC, a Task Force approved by our Church Leadership Team is developing a plan to advise the CLT on how our church can move forward together to extend God's welcome to all. We've had two task force meetings that have focused on hearing each other's stories. We've had one larger group gathering that provided a safe space for deeper listening and honest sharing with our own stories. We meet next this coming Tuesday, April 2, and we'll be looking at ways to bring our church together in conversation – and begin conversations within our larger community in order to build bridges of understanding and welcome. Stay tuned.
