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From Pastor Jim: Aha! 2019

January 1. New Year's! 2019. New choices. Resolutions. Change. There's nothing magical or mystical about a new year – or is there? Perhaps it is conditioning, perhaps it is culture, or perhaps it is faith that prompts us each year to consider areas of our lives where we need and/or want change. Here's one top ten list of changes people resolve to make:

- 1. Spend more time with family & friends
- 2. Fit in fitness
- 3. Tame the bulge
- 4. Quit smoking
- 5. Enjoy life more
- 6. Quit drinking
- 7. Get out of debt
- 8. Learn something new
- 9. Help others
- 10. Get organized (list from tripsavvy.com)

When it comes to resolutions, forget the past. Moving forward, what will help you experience lasting, positive, growth and change? Since this is a church newsletter, let's think in terms of following Christ, or your discipleship. And, suppose, instead of focusing on what we can do to change ourselves to be more faithful, more Christlike, etc.; that we focus elsewhere? Suppose we seek God and encounter God in ways that allow God to change us? Instead of "self help", we ask for God's help. This doesn't mean that it's all on God. Rather, we invite God to do what we cannot do on our own.

When it comes to spiritual growth and change, consider the Who, What, How, and Why. Let's ask God to reveal the what. Let's trust God to

help with the how. You are the who. And the why? One why that hit me recently comes from Essentialism: The Disciplined Pursuit of Less, by Greg McEown, which several of our church leaders are reading because of Next Level Innovations. In chapter 8, McEown leads off with the phrase, "Protect the Asset." It could also be a command. We get one chance at this life. No re-runs, re-takes, do-overs, or second chances. Your best asset to see you through this life is you: your self, your soul, your mind, your body. Protect it. Nurture it. Care for it. Do those things, if you want to be your best self and live your best life moving forward (we cannot do a single thing to change the past, so let it go). Here's my why and it can be your why if you like, or pick another.

A great time to begin change is the season after Epiphany, which begins January 6th and takes us to Lent. It is the season of the revealing, manifesting, disclosing, and illuminating of Christ as his earthly ministry begins. And it is about our awakening to Christ's presence in our lives and in our world; Christ who comes to make a difference, who comes to change us and shape us in God's image.

One way of describing an Epiphany is as an "Aha!" experience. Borrowing from Craig Groeschel's book, Aha!, I invite you to join me in making "Aha!" an acronym for your spiritual growth and change starting off the new year:

Awaken to the possibilities God has for you; whatever change God wants to work in you. Be Honest with God, with yourself, and with others



Drawing from Groeschel's book, scripture, and a variety of sources, I will be sending out a nightly email encourager for your morning read, beginning the evening of January 6th (Epiphany!). This is not intended to replace your devotional, the Trail Guide, etc.; but will be a short scripture, prayer reminder, and encouraging thought or question for the day relating to: Awakening to God's presence/work in you; being Honest with God, self,

Hopeful Deacon's Corner

This fall I have been working on completing my requirements for full membership in the United Methodist Church. Full membership means ordination in the UMC. You all have been so supportive of me in this process, and I want to give you a peak into all that I accomplished this fall.

One of the requirements was writing three papers on the following topics: Theology; Vocation and Leadership; and Practice of Ministry. I was also required to create a video to show how I practice ministry, so I recorded myself preaching a required sermon, and I recorded myself teaching and leading for the video. I was also required to create and lead a Bible study on the book of Ruth from scratch. I enjoyed leading that class with the women of Leesburg UMC this Fall. In total I wrote over 100 pages to meet requirements. It was a lot of work, but I truly could not have done with without the support of this church.

Thank you to everyone who sent cards, said a prayer for me, gave me flowers to brighten my study areas, asked me on Sunday mornings how it was going, rejoiced with me when it was done, sent encouraging texts, made me cookies, colored pictures to encourage me, and I could go on and on. I am beyond thankful for this community and the way they supported me through this part of the process. I am so lucky to serve this church.

The next step is to be interviewed by the Board of Ordained Ministry, which is made up of ministers and lay persons in the Virginia Conference who will have read and reviewed all my papers (and many others). The interview will be in Richmond on Monday morning, January 28th. I will go to three separate interview committees: Theology, Vocation and Leadership, and Practice of Ministry. I will discuss with them my papers, how I have grown over the past four years of ministry, and how I see God at work in my ministry. Following those interviews they will let me know if I will be ordained this June or if I need to come back again next year. Either result is truly a possibility, and I look forward to your support no matter the outcome.

The biggest gift I have received in writing these papers is the church's love and support through this process. Please continue to hold me in prayer as I prepare for my interviews later this month. Thank you, LUMC, for all your love and support.

Conversations that Connect #2: January 13th

In preparation for what may come out of the called General Conference in February (see article on Called General Conference), we are coming together for the second of several "Conversations that Connect." These are an attempt to bring us (LUMC) together in conversation to:

- Become informed about the called General Conference in February: what it is, who it involves, recommendations being presented, and what this means for local United Methodists and United Methodist churches.
- 2) Examine the ways scripture, faith, tradition, reason, experience, and culture shape our beliefs, with particular attention to how we read, interpret, and apply scripture. We'll look at a variety of biblical texts.
- 3) Listen to and learn from one another with regard to each other's beliefs, experiences, thoughts, and questions regarding LGBTQ+ issues. We recognize that people with deep faith, compassion, and respect for scripture and church tradition have divergent views. Have we faith, mutual respect, humility, and love enough to converse with those with whom disagree?
- 4) Pray for the work of the called General Conference.

The topics above were prompted by questions that arose at our first "Conversations...":

- What role does the local church have in all of this?
- How does scripture inform our understanding of sexuality from all sides?
- What effect will the decision of the General Conference have on the local church?
- How can we be more welcoming of those who are LGBTQ+?

"Conversations that Connect" will again include pizza and pot-luck. If you are coming for dinner, please bring a dish or dessert to share. For those who do not want dinner, feel free to come and participate in the conversations anyway!



- · Start reading the Bible today.
- Set aside a specific time and place each day. Set your schedule and then stick to it.
 Mornings are great; but feel free to use any time that works consistently with your schedule.
- Get a good study Bible to help to illuminate the meaning of the original Hebrew, Aramaic and Greek text.
- Choose a translation to use during your reading.
- Say a short prayer to God before you begin, asking the Holy Spirit to give you wisdom and understanding.
- Dive in and enjoy the richness of God's Word! Apply God's Word to your life. Bible study should be practical and applicable. I assure you that these seven steps will help you begin a journey in becoming a lifelong learner of God's Word.

Journey inside the pages of Scripture to meet a personal God who enters individual lives and begins a creative work from the inside out. 

The What: Thirty hours. It's just over one day, but in that short time, more than 7,000 kids will die of hunger-related causes.

30 Hour Famine: March 15 - 16

The Why:

The question is, will you care enough to let their hunger move you to action? Inspired by the love of God, you can join the fight: to keep kids alive; to give food to all who go hungry; to hunger for justice.

The How:

When you do the 30 Hour Famine, you're opening your eyes to the reality of global poverty. The funds you raise will bring hope to hungry kids: your brothers and sisters in the family of God. After registering, please set-up your fundraising page (see confirmation e-mail).

We will spend about 24 hours at church doing various poverty-related activities to teach of the condi-

tions faced by millions in the world today. It's a Lock-in, but with purpose and without food.*

We will close with a brief worship service that parents are strongly encouraged to come to, with Communion followed by a light meal.

* We will have juice at regular intervals. Those with medical conditions that prevent them from fasting should bring simple snacks that will be kept in a location removed from the group.

This year's High School Retreat was an unusual one. I heard a rumor just before Thanksgiving that Fieldstone UMC, the church that hosts SPY (Summer Project Youth, our annual youth mission trip), would be merging with another church while they "figure what to do with their building." First, I panicked, then I prayed. I felt a peace that God had a plan, and we just needed to let things unfold.

Upon confirming the news of Fieldstone, I panicked again, then prayed again. There are not very many mission trips that allow middle & school high school kids to be combined, nor that allow middle school students to do much in the way of work, nor that can accommodate a group our size (74 last year). I was reminded that Tim Dayton, the man who had made SPY what it was, had left to start a new program in Roanoke, remarkably called: REACH in Roanoke.

I contacted him and worked with the Director of Operations and found that they could take all of us, on the same week that families have blocked on their calendars and that the structure would be very similar to what we had become comfortable with.

I hoped to keep the changes under wraps until I could tell as many of our youth as possible at one time. You might be surprised to learn that teenagers love traditions and are skeptical of change just as much as everyone else. So, upon arriving at Eagle Eyrie in Lynchburg at 9:30 pm on a Friday night for the Fall Retreat, I gathered all 31 high school students together and broke the news that we would not be able to return to SPY in 2019.

I gave them a few minutes for the shock to wear off and then let them know of this new opportunity. I invited any who wanted to go to drive down to Roanoke the following day during the workshop portion of the retreat and check out REACH. We then sent them off to join their small groups, while the adults unpacked the vehicles and waited for their return.

On Saturday, we participated in worship and small groups, then while most went to workshops and had free time, Karl Higgins and I drove 13 juniors and seniors, and one sophomore, to Roanoke.

We were met by Tim and Casey, who gave us background into REACH and a good comparison between REACH and SPY. From Tim's perspective, REACH works much more closely with local agencies to connect with the people who most need help in the community. Students will have the opportunity to work on homes, as they did with SPY, but also to work in the homeless shelter, the local food pantry, and the animal shelter. They would also be given the opportunity, if they chose, to run a VBS for the neighborhood kids.

A couple of things that make REACH very different from SPY are:

• It is year-round. They have groups come on weekends that continue the work all year.

- They have a year-round staff which adds continuity and maintains relationships in the community.
- It is in a different building and a different city.
- It is more urban; groups will not have long drives to their work sites.
- They buy abandoned homes, fix them up, work with the bank and community organizations to make sure deserving families are able to purchase the homes.
- Evening programming takes place out in the community

It will be an adjustment to change our summer mission trip this year, but the youth who went on the tour were very excited about the opportunities this will bring. We are looking into bringing our seniors down in May, so they can work with the staff to plan our week and be much more involved in the development of the program.

Upon returning to the retreat, the seniors and I got ready and headed off to the Senior Banquet, a really fun and wonderful tradition of the High School Retreat. The rest of our group had their dinner and then we all met up for worship and small groups. There was a lip sync contest which some of our youth attended, while the rest enjoyed fellowship time in the cabin. We heard that a few of our youth who went on the field trip mentioned in their small group and discovered another group had attended both SPY and REACH in the past and gave REACH very high marks.

On Sunday, we participated in closing worship and drove back to Leesburg.

As we move forward to our new summer mission experience, we appreciate your prayers and support.

Here is what God has done through LUMC from January through November 2018.

LUMC has bountifully provided many types of goods to various causes:

- LUMC provided 2,574 backpacks of food for Catoctin Elementary School reduced or free lunch children who receive food every weekend during the school year.
- LUMC provided Loudoun Hunger Relief with \$515 in gift cards and 2,500 pounds of food.
- LUMC fulfilled the wishes of 50 children through the Salvation Army Angel Tree.
- LUMC provided 50 gifts for teens at the Loudoun County Youth Shelter.

Next Level Innovations: Update

Happy New Year! Now that the holidays are over, the focus teams are gearing up for next steps. Here's a quick update on what's already happened:

Vision Team met with our mentor Kirk Nave to review our vision alignment plan and develop a list of priorities for each of the focus groups to make sure we are putting vision in the "driver's seat".

Hospitality Team took advantage of the influx of Christmas guests by experimenting with the 5:00 pm service. All guests attending the 5:00 pm service received a gift thanking them for worshipping with us. As a follow up, guests will receive a letter this week and a home delivery of a gift and information on LUMC next week. As another innovation, attendance sheets were included in the bulletins at all Christmas Eve services. The team also researched hospitality techniques at several other churches and carefully reviewed the Mystery Worshipper reports we received.

Communications Task Force conducted interviews with various members of the congregation, particularly those in a leadership role, to assess our current modes of communicating. In order to get solid congregation feedback on communications, surveys were also included in the weekly bulletin for several weeks. Based on internal LUMC feedback and research of other churches, the Task Force has drafted and is reviewing their recommendations report. Their goal is to present the final report to the CLT within the next two weeks.

Save the Date! The first Town Hall meeting is scheduled for 2/27/2019. More information to come.

Reach Team is developing plans to grow a church wide emphasis on identifying and reaching our neighbors in Leesburg (i.e., individual neighborhoods, downtown Leesburg, civic groups, schools, etc.). Team members are gaining insight from the book The Art of Neighboring, which will also be the basis for a sermon series after the Easter season. They also plan to combine prayer-walking with our Lenten disciplines providing specific tools to help us be effective prayer-walkers.

Connect Team is planning to deepen the Disciple Group experience by showing members how to identify and

develop their own stories; practice sharing their stories with the group; discuss possible opportunities for sharing; identify their "circles of influence"; and pray for the Holy Spirit to empower them. Time will also be set aside in worship for members to learn about this process and hear the stories that are coming out of Disciple Groups to celebrate how God is working in our lives. Sharing our stories connect us with God and each other in a profound way.

Save the Date! Sharing Your Faith Workshop (Small Group) is planned for 2/10/2019 from 6:30 – 9:30 pm.


Our breakthrough prayer is being revised to reflect what we as a church are now seeking from God, post NLI approval. We will have one prayer for the whole congregation to be praying together, and a specific prayer for each Task Force.

The Seniors ministry is being revitalized to include intergenerational events such as "pilgrimages" to religious and cultural sites.

The United Methodist Church "Called General Conference" February 23-26, 2019

The purpose of the called General Conference¹ is "to receive and act on a report from the <u>Commission on a Way Forward</u> (COWF), based on the recommendations of the Council of Bishops in 2016." The 32-member Commission was instructed "to examine paragraphs in <u>The United Methodist Book of Discipline²</u> concerning human sexuality," explore options to strengthen the unity of the church, and make recommendations to the Council of Bishops. This has been done.

General Conference Prayer Challenge
