A Message from Pastor Jim

The Easter Season (the "Great Fifty Days") begins at sunset Easter Eve and continues to the Day of Pentecost. In sharp contrast to the penitential mood of Lent, the Easter Season proclaims the joy of the resurrection!

Thank you! to all who gave of their time, their talents, and their passion for Christ to help make our Lent and Holy Week worship memorable and meaningful – our Worship Team, Altar Guild, Chancel Choir, Raising Praise, Heavenly Ringers, greeters, ushers, Hospitality, Living Last Supper participants, Way of the Cross planners, and many more!

In addition to our corporate and more visible activities of worship, study, serving, and fellowship, many of us prayed for others in our church family during Lent. Thank you! In some cases, those praying did not even know the person they named each Sunday in prayer. There was one on my prayer list, a nonmember who has connected to LUMC through friends and some of our signature ministries that I could not picture in my mind. As I served communion on Easter Sunday, this person and their entire family came to my station. I realized when this person said their name for me to repeat, that this was the one for whom I had been praying! I was blessed to see others, whom I did know and for whom I had been praying, also in worship on Sunday! Several expressed their gratitude, and their surprise when they received their card in the mail.

A couple of those who had been praying for others during Lent expressed to me their joy in doing so. (I invite you to share your story, your blessings, for having prayed for others or for

discovering that someone had been praying for you. Visit our LUMC Facebook page and go to the group "Praying for one Another – Lent, 2019 to share your comments.) While our devotional praying-for-others guide has ended, I remember those for whom I prayed and will continue to keep them close in my heart and my prayers.

This Easter Season invites us now to focus on the new life we have in Christ, as evidenced by his resurrection and his ascension into heaven. It points us, ultimately, toward the incredible gift of the Holy Spirit that first Easter, and again on the Day of Pentecost. The Apostle Paul tells us in Romans 5 that, "God's love has been poured out into your hearts through the Holy Spirit" (verse 5). This love, God's love, is love that is meant to be shared! Thus we now shift our focus during this Season to discovering and demonstrating what it means to "love your neighbor as yourself" in practical, down-to-earth, everyday living kinds of ways. Our worship, and several of our disciple groups, will be focusing on this theme through Father's Day (see page 2 for more)

The question that God has impressed on my heart and which I pray God impresses on your heart is this: "What and who might change because I, and the members of LUMC, take seriously the command of Jesus, "love your neighbor" and apply it in practical ways?"

I am expectantly praying that the Holy Spirit so fills our hearts with God's love that we, and others, will see the ripple effect of God's transforming love at work!

Worship Series: "The Art of Neighboring"

When Jesus was asked to sum up the Torah (The Law) into one command, he said to love God with everything we have and to love our neighbors as ourselves. We have turned this foundational concept of loving our neighbors into a nice saying. But what did Jesus mean when he said, "and you shall love your neighbor as yourself"? Where did he get this idea from, anyway? We must also ask, "Can we take Jesus' command literally?" And, what might happen in our community, our schools, our places of work, our families, and our church, if all of us did?

When Jesus was asked to limit the concept of neighbor, he instead expanded it to include even a despised enemy of the Jews ("a Samaritan" - Luke 10:25-37). Our mission, should we choose to accept it, is to step out of our comfort zones, expand our understanding of "who is my neighbor?", learn more fully what Jesus' command means for us today, and put it into practice. Those who do will undergo change; and you will be an active partner with Christ in helping to change the world. "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." This was not a suggestion.

Our Guest Reenactor on Sunday May 19

The Rev. Alvin J. Horton is a recently retired pastor in the Virginia Conference. He served 15 years as Director of Communications for the conference and is former editor of the Virginia United Methodist Advocate. In 2002 he was named United Methodist Communicator of the Year. He also served as president of the United Methodist Association of Communicators and was elected to four jurisdictional conferences and three General Conferences. He began his pastoral ministry over 43 years ago, serving 25 of those years as pastor of local churches. He quickly found that presenting dramatic monologues as biblical characters offered an effective means of teaching children the stories of God's grace found in the Scriptures. Soon adults were asking *him* to do the same for them, and over the years he has performed in churches, at mission schools, on board ships, and in town squares of Canadian ports. He exchanged pulpits with a pastor in Belfast, Northern Ireland, traveled in the Middle East, and helped lead a Pauline study tour of the Mediterranean. He is married, has three sons and two granddaughters, and continues to be known for his inspirational writing and dramatic portrayals of biblical personalities.

"Sundays in Summer," One Worship Service Together, 9:30 am

"Sundays in Summer" is our Summer worship schedule that will consist of a single service at 9:30 am from June 16th through September 1st. This schedule was developed in light of our mission and vision as a church, and responding to the felt and real needs of our church family.

Its purpose: To grow together through the experience of community in worship to be the Church.

Reasons for the Change

- Many have expressed the desire to get to know others in our church family who worship at different times.
- Sunday morning is the one time when the majority of our church family come together for worship, serving, fellowship and spiritual growth.
- During the summer months, attendance dips and the diminished presence of others worshipers affects our experience of worship. Gathering all together creates a more energetic atmosphere of worship.
- Many miss being together for intergenerational worship, for at least part of the service.
- Many feel the need to build deeper relationship with others that go beyond mere acquaintance.

Key Considerations

Reaching new people: Inviting people to a new experience of Sunday mornings at LUMC where the presence of more people in worship together creates an energy and greater felt presence of God. In contrast to our typical Sunday worship, guests will see children, youth and adults all worshiping together.

Making disciples: We believe that discipleship is grounded in relationship. We will sharpen our focus on this aspect of our vision and being more intentional about getting to know one another. Clergy and Lay staff will have the potential to teach/lead during the discipleship time, and thus be in conversation with discussion groups. They will get to build relationships also!

Moving toward our Vision: It will focus us on being "One with Each Other", with an emphasis on what it means to be the church, and on spiritual gifts. We will also join in community service two times (June 16th and Sept 1st)

Experiencing community in worship in ways that help us be the Church: Trust the staff and ministry teams to plan, as we always do, and that they will take all legitimate concerns into consideration. Any and all are welcome to be part of our ministry teams that are doing this planning!



This schedule all summer helps ensure our volunteers are refreshed and eager to return to our regular schedule on September 8th






Each year, we hold our annual egg hunt on Easter, following the 9:45 service at the Old Stone Church historic site. Why?

Confirmation

The Confirmation program at LUMC has evolved over the years. Many of us might remember attending a Confirmation Class that met weekly for about three months, and this was how we did things at LUMC until 2008. We found that we had a significant number of youth come out for Confirmation, then never participate in any part of the church's ministries again, so we shifted to a longer process that involved the youth participating in retreats and youth group for a year. This change worked well for a number of years until our community entered the post-Christian era.

For most of our lives, we lived in the era of Christendom, a time when society supported the notion of church attendance and participation. While this era had been coming to a close slowly over the past several decades, from the perspective of Confirmation and youth ministry, it ended (here in Leesburg) in the fall of 2015 (in other parts of the state it's still alive, and in other places it ended long ago).

For the first Confirmation Class gathering that fall, we had just 30% of those who had signed up in attendance.

Before then, we averaged about 70% throughout the year, but we never had such a low turnout, particularly for the first event.

We asked questions and we listened: Was it a matter of priorities? Are people just not that interested? Is it too boring? Are people too overcommitted?

What we found was that there were some "yes" answers to the above questions, but by and large, our culture had simply taken a major shift.

Travel sports and other extracurricular activities, for example, had moved from one or two competitions or tournaments a season to nearly every weekend. Families were exhausted.

We experimented for a few years and found that families really want their kids to have the full experience of the retreats and youth group and class time, but they just cannot do it all in one year.

So we are changing our Confirmation process from a one year program to a three year program. Kids can begin in sixth grade and spend all of middle school exploring what it means to be a follower of Christ and to be a member of the United Methodist Church. This will also them to make a more informed decision at an older age.

This change means that we will not be Confirming any youth this year. It also means that we have adapted our Confirmation Retreat, one of the most special aspects of our program, into two separate retreats:

"In the Footsteps of Jesus Part 1" will be experienced by kids early in their journey and is intentionally designed to be an entry point into their life with Christ. They will experience the birth and baptism of Jesus and be invited to walk with Him through participation in the various ministries of LUMC.

"In the Footsteps of Jesus Part 2" will be completed just prior to being Confirmed and will be a culminating experience where they will walk with Jesus from the Transfiguration, through Palm Sunday and the Last

Supper, to the cross and experience the joy of Easter. Then, they will learn what it means to take their next steps as disciples who live as parts of the body of Christ.

This newsletter will be published around the time that our current group of fifth through seventh graders is gathering and traveling down to Westview on the James for "Part 1," led by Rev. Wishmyer and Angela Becek. Please be in prayer for their journey, both the physical and

spiritual aspects, as they seek to walk in the footsteps of Jesus.

Summer Reading Plan

Explore the period of the early church and their trials and triumphs

ABOUT THE READINGS: The Letters readings are inserted between the Acts readings at approximately the points when they were written. The "...Overview Video" links will take you to a video that gives some background and overview of each respective book. Some of the readings have dates noted—for Acts they are the dates when that part of the story is believed to have taken place; for the Epistles the dates are when they were believed to have been written.






United Methodist Men's Breakfast

Our Way Forward Together Task Force

The United Methodist Church Judicial Council will meet, April 23-25. This supreme court of nine members (United Methodist clergy and laity from around the world) will determine the constitutionality of several petitions passed at our special General Conference in February. They will not be enacting any additional legislation or making changes. The outcomes include: 1) all (that is before them) is deemed unconstitutional, therefore there are no changes to our United Methodist Book of Discipline; or 2) some or all of the petitions are deemed constitutional, resulting in parts of the Traditional Plan being added to our Book of Discipline.



LUMC's Our Way Forward Together task force encourages all to be praying for our Judicial Council and their decision-making. Following the meeting of the Council, we will be having a second "Dessert and Discussion" on Sunday, May 5, at 6:00 PM, to hear the results, spend time in conversation together, and share Holy Communion. The task force is preparing discussion topics to guide our conversations and help us better understand and appreciate one another as sisters and brothers in Christ, serving Christ in the midst of differing opinions. The aim of "Discussion" is not to convert or to convince, but to converse and connect.

Christ calls us to model a radically counter-cultural way of being in community that gives priority to listening, respecting, seeking to understand, searching for common ground, and above all love for neighbor that is "patient... kind... does not envy... does not boast... is not proud... does not dishonor others... is not self-seeking... is not easily angered... keeps no record of wrongs... does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth... always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres... and, never fails" (1 Corinthians 13:4-8a).

We are planning for a third "Dessert and Discussion" the evening of June 30.

In addition, Bishop Peter Weaver, our interim bishop, invites clergy and laity to join him for worship and conversation, at multiple locations and times, from May 10 through June 2. The closest locations and times for us will be May 10, 7:00 PM, Fairfax UMC, and May 11, 9:00 AM, Riverton UMC (Front Royal).
