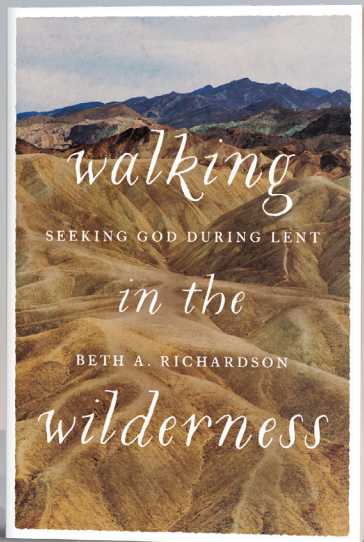

### *Camino a Belén*

Wise men. Kings. Magi. Called by different names, their story appears in Matthew 2:1-12. They followed a star that guided them to Bethlehem where they encountered the Christ child and gave him “gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh” (Matt. 2:11, NRSV).

The three figures depicted on the cover are arrayed in the way that we would imagine kings to be. Each one wears a bejeweled crown and offers a magnificent gift. But the majestic, brightly colored figures hold out their gifts and look downward, perhaps a sign of humility. This posture is not what we might expect from earthly kings. The star appears above them indicating that they have traveled the “Camino a Belén” — the road to Bethlehem — and have now arrived to present their gifts to the child.

The kings have unique crowns, faces, robes, and gifts — the artist uses wide, dark borders to create a unique shape and identity for each one. At the same time, the lines merge and blend, binding the three together in community as they share a new identity shaped by their experience of seeking the Christ child. The striking geometric shapes and colors of their faces direct our eyes toward the gifts they have brought with them. Who are these figures to us today, and what do they represent? Perhaps they are us, each unique but part of a community bound together as followers of the child born in Bethlehem.

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# Patient Faith

*Then Joseph got up, took the child and his mother by night, and went to Egypt, and remained there until the death of Herod.*

— Matthew 2:14-15 (NRSV)

When a new year arrives, I find myself impatient for a fresh start. Some years, the fresh start I anticipate is dramatic — starting a new job or forming a new habit. Other years, the fresh start is simply a return to a more predictable pattern of life after the bustle of the Christmas season. Regardless of the shape a new start takes, I want immediate results. But any meaningful change requires time and patience.

Mary, Joseph, and Jesus experienced a dramatic new start when they fled to Egypt to escape Herod (see Matt. 2:13-15). At God's urging, they fled the land they knew for a place of safety, not knowing how long they would stay. I imagine that following God's instructions must have required a great deal of trust and patience from Mary and Joseph as they set out for Egypt, not sure what would come next.

From the stories in this issue, it is clear that even today faithful living requires patient faith. Rarely does God immediately answer the prayers of many of the writers. Clarity about how God is working for good in a situation often comes only in retrospect. Healing, if it comes at all, takes time and care and rest. But the writers in this issue also demonstrate that patient faith is worth the struggle because when we practice our faith with intention and listen for God in the midst of our challenges, we will find that God is with us always. I pray that as you read this issue, you will find strength to persevere and courage to wait patiently to see how God is moving in your life this year.

# From the Archives

*With gratitude, we celebrated the retirement of our publisher, Stephen D. Bryant, in December 2020. His contributions to The Upper Room have been far-reaching. His Editor's Note from the March-April 2010 issue is reprinted below.*

In celebration of this 75th Anniversary year of *The Upper Room*, I invite you to explore the “upper room” in the Bible. The upper room first shows up described as “a large room upstairs” (Mark 14:12-15, NRSV) where Jesus shared a last supper with his disciples. This meal would forever symbolize our shared life with God in Christ.

The same upper room plays a role on Easter. The “house where the disciples had met” (John 20:19) on Easter evening was that familiar room. As the disciples huddled there in grief and fear, the risen Christ came among them. He spoke peace to their hearts and gave them power to forgive (20:19-23). A week later, Christ returned there and overcame Thomas’ doubt with convincing grace (20:24-29).

According to the account in Acts 1-2, the familiar “room upstairs” became the birthplace of the church. Following Jesus’ ascension (Acts 1:9-11), the disciples “went to the room upstairs . . . constantly devoting themselves to prayer” for many days (Acts 1:13-14). They prepared for spiritual transformation while actively waiting for “the promise of the Father” (Acts 1:4). On the Day of Pentecost all those together in prayer “were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages” the good news of Jesus Christ (Acts 2:4). Having been made one with Christ and one with each other, they became the body of Christ.

Why does the Bible never again mention the upper room? Because the place of new birth is not Jerusalem but any place people gather to seek Christ’s transforming presence. So day by day as you read *The Upper Room*, pause to enter into Christ’s presence right where you are. Make room in your heart for God’s transforming love, and resolve to go where the Spirit sends you to be Christ’s good news.

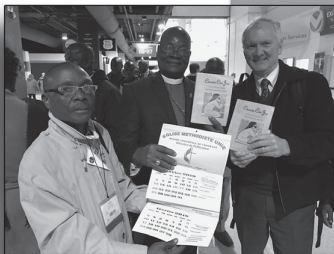
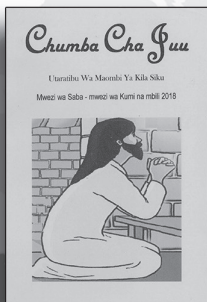

# THE JUNK DRAWER

READ Luke 9:1-6\*

*It is for freedom that Christ has set us free. Stand firm, then, and do not let yourselves be burdened again by a yoke of slavery.*

— Galatians 5:1 (NIV)

Every time I opened the junk drawer in my kitchen, I became stressed out and frustrated. I could never find what I needed, and the clutter was unbearable. Finally one day I decided to clean out that jam-packed drawer. In doing so, I discovered that I was holding on to a lot of unnecessary items that I had tossed into the drawer because “I might need that later” or “I just can’t give that up” or “I don’t know what to do with this.” In reality, I didn’t need those things at all, and they ended up as burdens — making the drawer a cluttered mess.

In life I carry around my own personal junk drawer filled with harbored hurts, worries, shame, sin — you name it. I lug it around every day, avoiding dealing with the contents but also refusing to let them go.

Reading today’s quoted scripture, I realized that for me the yoke of slavery was symbolized by the clutter of my junk drawer. Now, every

time I open my newly cleaned drawer, I remember that I don’t have to hold on to sin, shame, and anger because living with Christ has set me free.

is with me in my troubles.

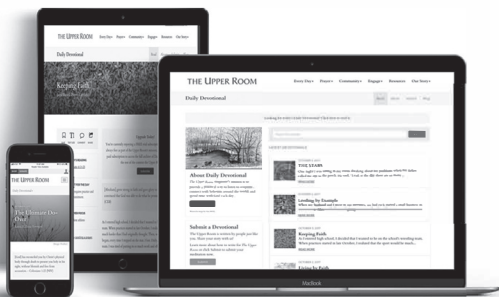
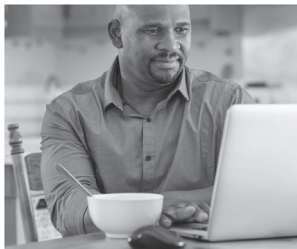

When I told my father that it bothered me to be in the tunnel because it was so scary, he said, “Do you want to see your grandmother?” “Of course,” I said. “Well, then,” he would say, “we have to go through the tunnel to get to your grandmother’s house.” After that, I would always watch for the light at the end of the tunnel because I knew it would lead to my grandmother.

Later in my life, I was going through a difficult divorce; sometimes I wished there were another way. I begged God to help me avoid this “tunnel time” in my life. But just as my loving father had reminded me — the only way *out* is *through*.

Though this experience was unpleasant, I knew better days were waiting for me. I would catch glimpses of God’s light even on the darkest days, and eventually I saw the full light at the end of my tunnel.

## *The Three Sillies*

One of my favorite fables is “The Three Big Sillies.” In the version I know from a childhood storybook, the first silly goes into the cellar to get eggs. She sees a gardening tool hanging from a beam in the ceiling and imagines it falling on someone’s head and killing him. Overcome with fear and sadness, she forgets about the eggs, sits down, and cries. The second silly goes to see what has happened to the first, and when the first silly tells the second silly the terrible thing that she has imagined, the second silly begins to cry as well. Then the third silly — wondering what has happened — goes to the cellar to find the other two sillies sobbing. When the first silly explains why, he joins them.

I find the whole scene hilarious — that three people could become so captive to such a far-fetched thought. However, I also recognize the truth in it and that the tale is an allegory of how easily fear can guide our minds.

In the Book of Numbers, Moses sent spies to scout out Canaan. They returned with negative reports, and it’s not much of a leap for me to feel the gloom when I read, “But the people who live there are powerful, and the cities are fortified and very large. We even saw descendants of Anak [giants] there” (Num. 13:28, NIV). Hearing this, “all the congregation raised a loud cry, and the people wept that night” (14:1, NRSV). Even in the face of God’s assurance that God was with them, their fear won out. It kept them from entering the land that God had promised them — the land of milk and honey. And they wandered in the wilderness for forty years.

Fear can stop the sanest, smartest, most well-grounded persons in their tracks. Fear is easy to justify and deadly to all the beauty, wonder, wisdom, and mystery that can accompany human relationships. It only requires the slightest turn of the imagination for everything to unravel. Fear can come on quick and strong and spread like wildfire. Above all, it has an almost unequalled ability to be destructive to the full, rich, good lives that God wants to give us.

Fear can, of course, serve a purpose. There is a good reason that I get a knot in my stomach when I move toward the edge of a cliff or that I am nervous to drive in a rainstorm at night. But fear loses its utility when the most absurd scenario is the only one I can fathom, and I start to believe that the worst that can happen will most certainly happen despite plenty of evidence to the contrary and God's reassurance that the giants in the land are no threat.

Presumably the three sillies emerged from the cellar, but I wonder what it took for them to realize that what they were weeping over would never come to pass. As I look out over the horizon of a new year, the landscape can appear as formidable as it does inviting. It would require little effort to imagine any number of situations that might go wrong. But I feel the deepest resolve to not let fear have the final say. Maybe what I fear the most will turn out to be filled with joy. Maybe a new friendship that I am reluctant to make or an endeavor that I am hesitant to undertake will turn out to be the most life-giving. Maybe the horrible thing I perceived from a distance will turn out to be unimaginably beautiful close up. And certainly, whatever the scenario and however powerful my fear, God will be there, drawing me out of the cellar and toward abundant life.



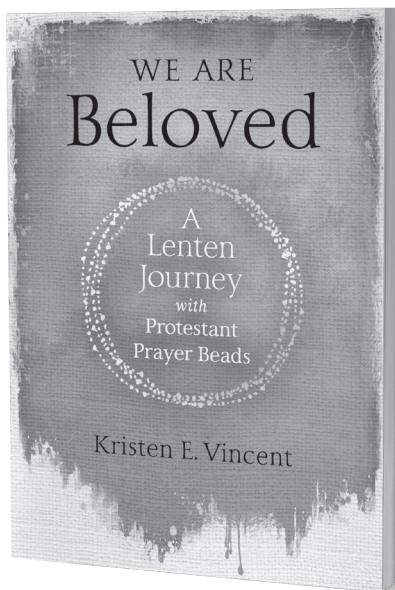

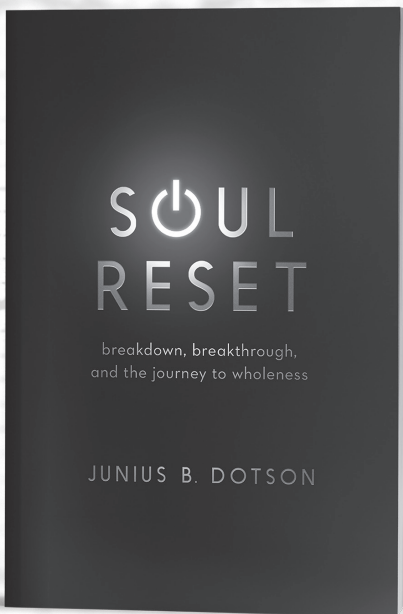


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## LIONS AND BEARS

grew along with our love for our community.

We came up with the idea of a “reverse tithe.” We kept the gleanings and gave away most of the produce. # NOT ALONE

After a night at the children's hospital with our daughter, I did not welcome the telephone ringing at 7:00 a.m. I saw that the call was from my oldest son, Barry, who had been in another hospital for a few days with the flu. Irritated by the early hour, I answered the phone sleepily — but it wasn't Barry on the phone. It was a nurse calling to tell me that Barry had died.

Barry was a diabetic and in renal failure, but he had recently made great strides in taking care of himself. Set to graduate from college after working at it for 17 years, his sudden death seemed particularly cruel in light of his recent progress. Grief compounded by concern for our daughter threatened to overcome me.

Our pastor pointed out in a sermon that though God didn't take Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego out of the fire, God did protect them. I finally understood that God does not promise freedom from difficulties. In fact, Jesus specifically said that his followers would have distress (see John 16:33, CEB). But God promises to be with us through whatever we face.

Whenever grief wells up, I draw strength from knowing that God is here with me and will work things together for good (see Rom. 8:28).

**Prayer:** Loving Father, thank you for your presence with us in our challenges. Help us draw strength from you. In Jesus' name we pray. Amen.

# AN EASY PLAN TO USE *The Upper Room* IN SMALL GROUPS

Christ is among us in fresh ways when we gather together, listening to God and to each other.

- Begin by reading the Bible passage on the Read line and the day's meditation, allowing silence for at least a minute afterward. Then ask members to turn to the questions for that date listed below or on one of the following pages.
- Ask someone to read aloud the questions one by one, giving each group member the opportunity to answer after each question. If anyone prefers not to answer a particular question, move on to the next person.
- Discuss how everyone thinks differently, and try to hear what the Holy Spirit may be saying to you in all this.
- Decide what you will do with God during the week.
- Be quiet and pray together.

## JANUARY 6: *Choosing a Path*

1. Do you believe God has one clear path for our lives, and that we can miss the path and be out of God's perfect will? Why or why not? What scripture verses support your answer?
2. In what ways has God blessed your acts of service? How are you encouraged by those blessings?
3. How do you make sure you are seeking God in everything? How can you tell when you are seeking God and when you are not? What spiritual practices keep you focused on God?
4. What gifts and talents can you use to serve others for God? In

what ways are you already using those gifts for God?

In what new ways would you like to start using your gifts?

5. When have you felt unsure of how to serve God? Who or what helped you find direction? How might you help someone else who is feeling unsure of how to serve?

### JANUARY 13: *Encountering God*

1. Describe a time in your life when you have experienced loneliness and rejection. What did you do to combat those feelings?
2. Which verses from today's reading do you most relate to? Why? What verses from other psalms do you find encouraging?
3. Today's writer talks about the loneliness David must have felt in 1 Samuel. What other biblical characters experienced loneliness? How did they find peace and comfort? What can you learn from their stories?

3. Have you ever felt like you needed to have all the answers about your faith? Is it hard for you not to have all the answers? Why or why not?
4. Does following God's guidance get easier over time? How do you make sure you are always listening for God's guidance?
5. How can you share God's love with someone today? What new habits can you begin that will help you share God's love more effectively?

## JANUARY 27: *Promises in Uncertainty*

1. Are you in a place of uncertainty right now or have you been in one in the past? Reflect on those times, and share what you need from God, others, and yourself amid uncertain circumstances.
2. How has God shown you that God's love is certain? What does it mean to you that you are guaranteed unfailing love at all times? How does that change the way you respond to life's challenges?
3. When have you experienced God's protection in difficult times? How have you held on to that protection? What spiritual practices help you hold on to God in hard times?
4. Describe a time when you most clearly saw God's provision in your life — physically or spiritually. Describe a time when it felt like God was not providing for you in the ways you would have liked. How did you hold on to and remain close to God each time?

4. What scripture passages and prayer practices help you to focus on the needs of those around you? How is God calling you to help those in your community who are hurting?

5. In what ways does your church reach out and show God's compassion to others? Do you participate in those efforts? In what other ways does your church community encourage you to help those around you?

### **FEBRUARY 10: *Being Present***

1. Do you participate in a small group? In what ways have you benefited from the group? What practices might your group implement to help its members avoid distractions?
2. Why do you think Jesus was so good at focusing on others? What can you learn from Jesus' focus? How will you try to follow his example today?
3. List some common distractions that weigh on you before or during a worship service, small-group meeting, or devotional time. How can you intentionally avoid those distractions in the coming week?
4. Read your favorite scripture passage containing the phrases "Jesus saw" or "Jesus looked." Why do you like that passage? What does it teach you about yourself, Jesus, or others?
5. What helps you to slow down and focus on the present moment? How do you most notice God's love when you slow down in that way? How do you make sure you take time to notice the holiness of those moments?

### **FEBRUARY 17: *From Sticks to Blossoms***

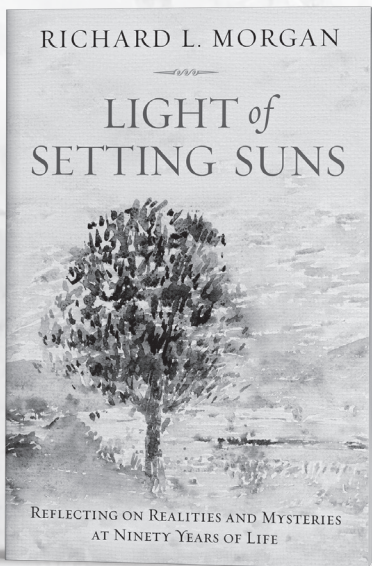
1. When have you had to wait for something that, when it came to fruition, was worth the wait? How was that experience similar to what today's writer describes about the broom tree?
